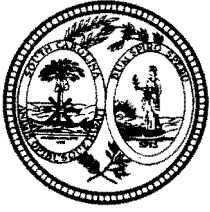

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ORGANIZATION

The Legislative Audit Council is composed of three public members and six ex officio members. The public members, one of whom must be a practicing certified or licensed public accountant, are elected in a joint session of the General Assembly from a list chosen by a nominating committee. Any person who is a member of the General Assembly, or has served in the preceding two years, cannot be elected as a public member of the Council. Public members are elected to six-year terms and vote on all Council matters.

Ex officio members of the Council can vote on all matters except those pertaining to audit functions and personnel. The six ex officio members are the Chairmen of the Senate and House Judiciary Committees; the Chairmen of the Senate Finance and the House Ways and Means Committees; the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and the Lieutenant Governor.

Budget reductions resulted in the loss of two professional staff positions in FY 87-88 and have contributed to delays and slow down in some audit work. The total staff of 22 is headed by a Director. Seventeen professional staff of the Legislative Audit Council perform the audit work which is published in reports presented to the Legislature. The staff have varied backgrounds in areas such as business management, public administration, accounting, law, political science, education, economics, computer science, and statistics. This allows the Council to bring a broad perspective to its audit work.

AUDIT WORK

Under §2-15-10 et seq. of the South Carolina Code of Laws, the Audit Council is required to audit the operations of state agencies, to investigate fiscal matters as required, and to provide information to assist the General Assembly. During FY 87-88, the Audit Council issued 14 performance audits. Some of these audits were conducted at the request of individual legislators or groups of legislators who have questions about potential problems in state agencies or programs. Other audits were performed as a result of statutory mandate. For example, the Sunset Act of 1978, the Education Finance Act of 1977, and §1-11-350 of the South Carolina Code Laws all mandate specific audits to be performed on a regular basis. In FY 87-88, audits fell into four categories:

- Comprehensive Agency Audits
- Sunset Audits
- Program Audits
- System-Wide Audits

Comprehensive Agency Audits

The nature of a comprehensive agency audit makes it the most time-consuming and lengthy audit type. Both fiscal and programmatic aspects of the operation must be investigated to fulfill audit standards. In FY 87-88, one comprehensive agency audit was released. Comprehensive approach covers five basic audit areas:

- (1) The agency's compliance to laws and regulations;
- (2) The efficiency of an agency's operations and expenditures;
- (3) The economy of a program or agency--assesses whether the services provided are worth the cost;
- (4) The effectiveness of an agency--assesses whether it adequately serves the public and fulfills the goals and expectations of those who appropriate its funds; and
- (5) The agency's financial management and accountability systems.

Sunset Audits

The Sunset Act of 1978 (Act 608, Title 1, Chapter 20) requires full-scope reviews of 40 state agencies and boards, carried out on a six-year cycle, to determine the impact that would occur if these agencies were terminated or reduced. The findings from sunset audits are used by the State Reorganization Commission and appropriate legislative committees as they consider whether to take action to reestablish the agencies. Public hearings are held as a part of this review process. In FY 87-88, the Council participated in the public hearings of seven boards scheduled to be terminated June 30, 1988. The Council also reviewed seven other boards scheduled for termination June 30, 1989. An additional Sunset review was performed as an update to the 1986 Sunset Review of the Board of Dentistry.

Along with the two types of audits discussed, the Council performs program audits and system-wide audits.

Program Audits

At the direction of the General Assembly, the Council conducts audits of particular state programs, activities, or special issues. These audits assess how efficiently, effectively, and economically a program is operated. They also address other questions, such as whether a program is being carried out in accordance with the General Assembly's intent, or whether changes in the program would better serve the Legislature's goal of providing high-quality public services to South Carolinians at a reasonable cost. The Council published three program audits in FY 87-88.

System-Wide Audits

The Council audits state systems and activities which affect many agencies at the state and local level. System-wide audits since 1975 include studies of the state budget process, the public education system, and noncompetitive procurement. These audits examine the economy and efficiency with which services are provided and often recommend ways to reduce duplication of services. In FY 87-88, two system-wide audits reviewed policy and policy implementation in an attempt to identify alternatives where necessary. This type of audit extends beyond agency boundaries and may have a cross-agency impact.

Audit Request

In general, requests for audits are received in writing from the General Assembly as a whole, its committees, or its individual members. Other audits are performed when mandated by a specific piece of legislation or resolution. When a specific request for an audit is received, the requestor is notified that it will be placed on the Legislative Audit Council agenda.

The Council then evaluates the request using several criteria including:

- (1) The Council's enabling legislation, which states:

A request for fiscal research or related information for a standing committee, or for the Speaker of the House, or President Pro Tem of the Senate, shall take priority over such a request by an individual member of either body, except where that information has been previously requested by an individual member;
- (2) The impact of the program or agency on the citizens of South Carolina;
- (3) The amount of public funds appropriated to the agency;
- (4) The potential impact of the Council's recommendations on the efficient and effective delivery of services; and
- (5) The existing workload.

Requests for audits are assigned priorities and scheduled based on these five criteria. At this time, the requestor is notified.

The Legislative Audit Council encourages members and committees of the General Assembly to submit requests for audits. In this way, the Council is better able to discern the interests and concerns of legislators and to respond to these interests.

Audit Standards

In order to present unbiased information to the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Council seeks to work in an objective and independent manner. To this end, all audit reports are documented according to accepted practices and standards recognized by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA), the United States General Accounting Office (GAO), and organizations concerned with legislative program evaluations.

In order to prevent unintentional error or bias, a draft copy of the audit report is discussed with the staff of the agency under review. The agency is invited to reply to the audit in writing, and its written comments become a part of the final report. An audit report must be reviewed and approved by the public members of the Legislative Audit Council. Until the report is given to the General Assembly, the information it contains is considered confidential. Upon publication, all audits become a matter of public record. Copies of the audit are sent to each member of the General Assembly, the Clerks of the House and Senate, and the State Constitutional Officers, the Office of the Governor, the State Library, and the agency under review.

Members of the public and other interested parties are provided copies of the audit upon request. In addition, the audit manager of each audit is available to discuss any specific questions about the audit.

REVIEW OF AUDITS COMPLETED

The following section provides a brief summary of the audits completed during FY 87-88. A list of all audits performed to date follows the summaries.

Sunset Review of the Board of Dentistry

The Council found the Dentistry Board is needed to protect the public health. State law should be amended to permit general supervision of dental hygienists so that the dental health needs of the state would be better served. Dental assistants should be required to pass competency examinations. The regulation of dental technicians who do not provide direct patient care may not be necessary.

A Management Review of the Health and Human Services Finance Commission

The Council found that the management of health care and social service programs could be improved. Approximately \$36 million was improperly expended, improperly managed, or could be saved through implementing Audit Council recommendations. Inaccurate information was presented to the Budget and Control Board, and provider rates were improperly established. Repeated staff reorganizations hindered agency efficiency.

A Limited-Scope Review of the South Carolina Department of Mental Health

The Department of Mental Health (DMH) needs to improve the planning, procurement, and monitoring of contracts. Contract costs were not adequately controlled. However, a "revenue enhancement" contract entered into by DMH could gain substantial additional revenues for the state. Also, in an unusual practice for an agency head, the Commissioner accumulated compensatory time for overtime hours worked.

A Program Review of the South Carolina Workers' Compensation System

This review focused on the Workers' Compensation Commission, the agency that administers workers' compensation laws in South Carolina, and also addressed broader issues relating to the workers' compensation program and its efficiency and effectiveness. The Council found problems with the statutes as well as with the Commission's administration of the law. As a result, there is reduced assurance that the system is equitable to injured workers and employers. Cost issues were also reviewed and the affect of proposed changes on costs assessed. It was recommended that the appropriate legislative committees develop a consensus on needed reform of the workers' compensation program and that the Commission report on its implementation of recommended changes.

A Compliance Review of the South Carolina Budget and Control Board Division of Motor Vehicle Management

The Council reviewed the compliance of the Division of Motor Vehicle Management and state agencies, as reflected by their interaction with the Division, with state fleet management law and regulations. The Division has not prepared the required annual management review of each agency's performance in complying with fleet management law and regulations. Other compliance problems were found with provisions regarding the use of privately-owned vehicles, individual vehicle assignments, and purchase of cost-effective vehicles and maintenance program

guidelines. Additionally, the Division has not developed the required criteria for each agency to use in implementing a uniform cost accounting and reporting system.

A Statewide Review of Noncompetitive Procurements

The state's procurement system for noncompetitive purchases during FY 85-86 was reviewed. Included in the review were sole source procurements, emergency procurements, and various exemptions to the Procurement Code. Samples were drawn from procurements of the 11 agencies which accounted for over 80% of the state's sole source expenditures in FY 85-86. The Audit Council found that, in general, agencies are using the sole source and emergency procurement procedures in compliance with state law. Recommendations for improvements were made in areas such as consultant hiring.

A Management and Performance Review of the South Carolina Commission for the Blind

The Council found no evidence of a pattern of significant mismanagement by the Commission. The Council did find, however, that the influence of an outside interest group has interfered with Commission activities and affected the administration of agency programs. Also, the Council found problems in administration, including an overcentralized organizational structure and ineffective use of the computer system. In the area of client services, the Council found: cases were closed as successfully rehabilitated when the primary service provided was payment of a medical bill; the economic benefits of the Blindcraft program were small relative to program costs; and implementation of a set aside program for vending machines operated by blind vendors could generate \$160,000 annually.

A Sunset Review of the Public Service Commission

The Council concluded that the General Assembly should relax economic regulation of the intrastate motor carrier industry. The Council also found that truck safety enforcement could be better performed by transferring PSC inspectors to the Department of Highways and Public Transportation. In the Utilities Division, the Council found that the Commission should document the reason a specific rate of return on common equity is chosen in rate cases. The Council also noted improvements which have been implemented by new management.

A Sunset Review of the Manufactured Housing Board

The Council concluded that the Manufactured Housing Board should be discontinued and that the Manufactured Housing Section of the Division of General Services should assume responsibility for regulation of the manufactured housing industry. The Board does not administer a test or require any formal training of persons applying for a manufactured housing license. Also, the Board's meeting schedule may impede the resolution of complaints. In addition, the Board duplicates the functions of the Manufactured Housing Section of General Services by resolving complaints prior to the appeals process.

A Sunset Review of the Real Estate Commission

The Council concluded that regulation of the real estate industry should continue. However, the Council recommended that the statutes dealing with real estate exams, the Commission's authority to approve real estate proprietary schools, and vacation time sharing plans be examined. Also, the Commission needs to improve its inspection process.

A Sunset Review of the Licensing Board for Contractors

The Council determined that the Licensing Board for Contractors should be continued. In most areas, the Board has operated efficiently. However, improvements are needed in the Board's examinations and in the administration of penalties for licensing law violations. Also, the General Assembly may wish to consider amending some laws which are restrictive or which result in inefficiencies or duplication between the Board and other agencies.

A Sunset Review of the Residential Home Builders Commission

The Council concluded that regulation of residential home builders should continue. In most areas, the Commission has operated efficiently and effectively. However, improvements are needed in complaint administration and personnel evaluations.

The Council concluded that the Board regulating environmental systems operators should be continued. Termination of regulation would pose a threat to public health, safety and welfare. However, the Board can improve its efficiency by adopting written policies and procedures and a biennial licensing schedule. In addition, statutes governing Board membership need to be studied.

A Sunset Review of the Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors

The Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors is needed to protect the public. The Board has operated efficiently and effectively. However, the preparation of Board exams for land surveyors could be improved.
