New Listing in the National Register of Historic Places

The **Columbia Commercial Historic District** was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on October 20, 2014. The district includes commercial buildings north of the State House primarily within the 1500, 1600, and 1700 blocks of Main Street along with its cross-streets. The district is significant under commerce and architecture as it represents broad patterns in Columbia's commercial history and exhibits architectural styles no longer found elsewhere in the city.

The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation has recently posted its new “Guidance on Agreement Documents” online at <http://www.achp.gov/agreementdocguidance.html>. The Guidance is designed to walk stakeholders through the process of developing and writing a clear, concise agreement document under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act to address an undertaking's effects to historic properties or develop a programmatic agreement. It is augmented by two checklists, sample agreement documents, and an extensive series of example stipulations.

Grant Application Deadlines

December 3, 2014: Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections Grants. The National Endowment for the Humanities invites applications from nonprofit museums, libraries, archives, and educational institutions in the United States for the Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections grant program. This program supports planning and implementation of sustainable preventive conservation projects that pragmatically balance preservation goals, cost, and environmental impact. Wednesday, January 14, 2015: Humanities Council^{SC}'s Major Grants. Major Grants (\$2000 - \$8000) support public programs designed to be accessible by a broad audience, to serve citizens in urban, rural, and small-town settings, and to make possible humanities programs that illuminate and enrich the lives of both audiences and scholars. January 16, 2015: American Battlefield Protection Program Battlefield Preservation Grants. Non-profit groups, academic institutions, and local, regional, state, and tribal governments are invited to apply for grants for eligible projects: archaeology, cultural landscape inventories, cultural resource documentation, GIS mapping, National Register nominations, and preservation plans. Project funding ranges from \$5,000 to \$75,000. Matching funds or in-kind services for the projects are encouraged but not required. February 6, 2015: Federal Historic Preservation Grants. Administered by the SHPO, these grants can assist two types of projects: (1) Survey and Planning Projects—eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning; (2) Stabilization Projects—eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather (only for projects in Certified Local Government (CLG) communities). Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Federal Historic Preservation Grant. At least 10% of the state’s annual grant from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. As funding is available after the required CLG minimum is met, then non-CLG projects may also be selected for funding. Grant awards generally range from \$1,500 to \$25,000.
