The Colleton County First Steps Board and I believe our most significant achievements in the past fiscal year were implementing additional “home visitation” programs. These programs include: Nurse Family Partnership, Parents as Teachers, and Countdown to Kindergarten. These programs consisted of over 50% of our budget.

These family involvement programs implemented over the past 5-10 years, according to data from the Kids Count report for 2015, reflect an improvement in infant mortality rates and child deaths ages 1-14. We believe that these programs have helped to make this difference in Colleton County.

Also, we have seen an increase in DSS/ABC Quality scores for some of our child care providers during the past 5 years. This increase in scores we believe is directly related to quality child care provider training through funding received from outside sources. We are thankful for partners who provide funding for this important program.

Our programs require a successful collaboration with community partners. We ask all parents and partners to join us as we launch new programs and continue programs that have proven outcomes. Parents find our programs easy to participate in and appreciate the educational books and materials we supply to enhance their role as their child’s first teacher.

What We Do



Each of the six color blocks of the First Steps logo represents a core area of service, outlining our comprehensive strategy to prepare children for long-term school success.

With measurable outcomes across each of its six school readiness strategy areas, First Steps is getting results.



Healthy Start

We begin with a focus on providing a healthy start to life. This includes prenatal and post-partum services for both mother and baby. In 2007, First Steps collaborated with key philanthropic and agency partners to bring Nurse-Family Partnership to SC having a significant impact on reducing premature births and Medicaid costs.



Quality Childcare

Quality childcare starts with quality childcare providers. Our quality enhancement and training strategies lead to improved teacher-student interaction, which research shows has a significant impact on a child's development and success in school.



Family Strengthening

Our home visitation strategies, such as Parents as Teachers, Parent-Child Home and Early Steps to School Success, are helping parents understand their responsibilities to care for and be positive models for their children. As a result of First Steps' intervention and parenting support, 66% of clients initially assessed at "low" levels of parenting have achieved moderate or high levels of parenting skill.



Early Education

Private-public partnerships through First Steps 4K have led to significant cost efficiencies in the delivery of publicly funded 4K. One recent analysis suggests First Steps is achieving comparable results, without the need for costly capital construction, for 80 cents on the dollar.



Early Intervention

According to recent federal evaluations, outcomes for clients participating in BabyNet early intervention programs are above national averages. BabyNet matches the special needs of infants and toddlers who have disabilities and/or developmental delays with customized, community-based resources.



School Transition

Each of the corresponding blocks of services leads ultimately to the goal of transitioning children successfully to school. Programs like Countdown to Kindergarten and From Day One to Grade One are ultimately preparing children for school success.

Based on the needs of our community, Colleton County First focuses its investments in Family Strengthening and Child Care Training.

Helping vulnerable first-time mothers empowers them to achieve a better life for themselves and their children.

Program Description

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) helps transform the lives of vulnerable first-time mothers and their babies. Through ongoing home visits from registered nurses, low-income, first-time moms receive the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy, provide responsible and competent care for their children, and become more economically self-sufficient. From pregnancy until the child turns two years old, Nurse-Family Partnership Nurse Home Visitors form a much-needed, trusting relationship with the first-time moms, instilling confidence and empowering them to achieve a better life for their children – and themselves.

In Colleton County, Nurse-Family Partnership is implemented through Department of Health and Environment Control.



Colleton First Steps serves families in greatest need. NFP families have the following needs:

- 90% ...families live below the poverty line
- 43% ...teen parents
- 22% ... do not graduate from high school

- ✓ 60% are employed and 39% are currently in school working to obtain a high school diploma or GED
- ✓ 79% initiated breastfeeding, 22% continued at 7 months, and 16% continued at one year
- ✓ 98% have immunizations up to date at 18 months

Parents play a critical role in their child's development.

Program Description

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an evidence-based home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:

1. **Personal Visits** at least twice monthly
2. **Monthly Group Connections** with other PAT families
3. **Screenings and Assessments** to identify developmental concerns
4. **Connections to Outside Resources** that families may need to succeed

Colleton County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our PAT families:

67% ... live in poverty

34% ... exposed to domestic violence

34% ... referred to BabyNet

This year, our Parents as Teachers program:

- ✓ Averaged over 2 home visits per family (Parents as Teachers model implementation requires us to visit each family at least 2 visits per month).
- ✓ Of the 13 families served during the 2015-2016 fiscal year, 46% of the families met 9 months of continuous service.
- ✓ The ACIRI Assessment Summary shows that 17% of clients being served met the requirements.
- ✓ Our Parents as Teachers program distributed 156 books to children and families in our program. Many of our families have created a special place in their homes for storing books and encouraging reading.

Parent Training

Parents are their child's first and best teachers.

Program Description

Family literacy programs offer an integrated and family-friendly approach, helping both parents and children to improve their literacy skills. Family literacy services integrate all of the following:

1. Adult Education
2. Child Education
3. Parent Education
4. Interactive Parent/Child Activities

Our family literacy program:

- ✓ Provides parents of young children with information to increase their education levels
- ✓ Provides information about who to contact for documented delay programs for their children
- ✓ Teaches parents how to support their child's literacy and overall development
- ✓ Provides quality early learning experiences for children 0-5 while their parents attend adult education

Colleton County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Colleton County data reflects the following:

- 39.3% ...children under 5 live in poverty
- 22% ... birth mothers have less than a high school diploma
- 49.8% ... Children living in single parent families



As an incentive to have parents send us their contact information, we pick a winner each quarter to receive a basket full of educational materials. The above picture is Alexandra Hodges with her new son, Kears Winter born June 14, 2016. Alexandra has two other sons, Chance Winter – 3 years old and Durell Winter – 2 years old. We are planning to add this family to our Parents as Teachers Program.

This year, our Family Literacy program:

- ✓ Provided bags with educational materials to over 300 new mothers who gave birth in the Colleton County Hospital this past year.
- ✓ Provided materials to increase literacy with a focus on teaching parents on how to read to their children and how to increase their children's vocabulary.
- ✓ Attempted to increase the new mothers education enrollment at the Colleton County Adult Learning Center/Colleton County School District.
- ✓ Provided Bringing Baby Home a book written by an Early Education Educator that covers many items that may occur during the first year of a child's life.

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Early Education With Books

Children’s reading scores improve dramatically when parents are involved in helping them learn to read.

Program Description

According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, the peak period for brain development related to language is around **nine months of age. One of the easiest and most effective ways to build this capacity in young children’s brains is to read to them.**

Colleton County First Steps provides free, age-appropriate books to children age birth to 5 years throughout the county.

Our partnership with our library provides collaboration between the agencies that both promote reading and literacy to children in Colleton County.

We have collaborated with the library to supply books to the bookmobile that supports rural parts of the county.



This mom and 2 year old won the Summer Reading Program at the library, having read the most books during the 2 month period.

- ✓ Books were distributed to Colleton County Memorial Library to be distributed to children in rural areas of the county on the bookmobile.
- ✓ Provided books to be distributed through the Department of Social Services to clients and foster children.
- ✓ Provided books to local churches for children attending Bible Schools, Sunday School, and Back to School programs.
- ✓ Provided books to the child care providers throughout the county to distribute to the families they serve.
- ✓ Distributed books to 235 children served in our Christmas Project, serving children in needy families.

Child Care Training

Those who care for young children need high-quality, accessible, and affordable professional development.

Program Description

High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce.

First Steps-sponsored training is certified through the SC Center for Child Care Career Development and includes topics in the areas of nutrition, health and safety, curriculum, child guidance, professional development and program administration. Best practices in training include not only the training itself, but follow-up in the classroom.

Child Care Scholarships

Too many families in Colleton County cannot afford quality care for their children.

Program Description

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few - or no - affordable care options.

Colleton County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

- 67% ... live in poverty
- 34% ... exposed to domestic violence
- 34% ... were referred to BabyNet
- 56% ... had developmental delays

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least one developmental screening each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

All of our scholarships are provided to families that participate in the Parents as Teachers program.

This year, our Scholarship program:

- ✓ Provided 9 children with scholarship assistance so their parents could work or attend school
- ✓ Identified and addressed 7 potential developmental delays among scholarship children (ASQ Report)
- ✓ Made 36 connections for families to services such as: dental, hearing, vision, food, shelter.
- ✓ Supported 4 child care providers in Colleton County by subsidizing child care tuition for families who would not otherwise be able to afford quality care.
- ✓ Provided 18 hours of training for scholarship parents in topics such as music, fire protection, and healthy eating habits.

Bringing parents and teachers together as partners sets the foundation for success in school.

Program Description

Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a summer home visitation model connecting rising kindergartners and their families with their future teachers. The program is designed:

- ✓ to forge strong and lasting home-school relationships,
- ✓ to acquaint children and families with the state and classroom expectations to increase the likelihood of school success,
- ✓ to increase parent involvement in the early grades (particularly in hard-to-reach communities), when children's learning is foundational for life success; and
- ✓ to increase public awareness of the importance of school readiness and provide ways for parents and communities to impact children's early school success.

Countdown to Kindergarten integrates all of the following:

Home Visitation. Teachers make six visits over the summer to the homes of participating students and families. Children and families are introduced to actual materials used in kindergarten and are given a Kindergarten Transition Toolkit to keep.

Learning Celebration. The last visit is a "field trip" to the school where the child will attend class in the fall.

Public Awareness. Throughout the summer, First Steps releases tips to media to help parents and caregivers get children ready for kindergarten.


This year, our Countdown to Kindergarten program had parents complete a pre/post survey. The surveys reflected the following:
