Credit Group, a consortium of five Farm Credit Associations to buy and sell large loans. Heustess developed the accounting procedures for the consortium and led the association's accounting staff in managing the daily accounting of the consortium.

The FMU observatory is located beyond the outfield fence of the FMU Softball Field, south of the Smith University Center. Visitors can park in Lot D at the southern end of the campus and follow the walkway to the observatory.
