

SOUTH CAROLINA STATE PLAN FOR FEDERAL DEPOSITORY LIBRARIES

Michael DiMario, U. S. Superintendent of Documents, responded favorably on July 12 to the State Plan for Federal Depository Libraries that was submitted by South Carolina in May.

Mr. DiMario stated, "It is obvious to me that a great deal of thought and hard work has gone into producing this comprehensive plan." He is having the Government Printing Office's General Counsel review the State Plan to see if modifications are necessary. Mr. DiMario sees "no difficulty with a shared regional responsibility for South Carolina."

When the State Plan goes into effect, Clemson University, the University of South Carolina, and Winthrop College libraries will share responsibility for receiving all federal depository documents; and the South Carolina State Library will coordinate administrative details and discard procedures for depository libraries.

LSCA TITLE III GRANTS AWARDED

The South Carolina State Library has approved LSCA, Title III grants for 1983-84. Clemson University, The University of South Carolina, Winthrop College, and the Charleston County Library have received grants to assist them in the retrospective conversion of their bibliographic records into machine readable format. The University of South Carolina Processing Center has received a grant for the purchase of an additional OCLC terminal which will enable them to begin a retrospective conversion of the holdings of the two and four year campuses of the University of South Carolina. A grant was made to the Horry County Library to assist the library in becoming a member of SOLINET. Title III of the Library Services and Construction Act is used to promote cooperation and the sharing of the state's total library resources.

SCLA CONFERENCE

"Library Relationships: Together in the 80's" is the theme of the 57th annual convention of the South Carolina Library Association to be held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Greenville, October 13-October 15, 1983.

Registration will begin on Thursday, October 13, at 9 a.m. with exhibits opening at noon. A pre-conference sponsored by the Bibliographic Instruction Interest Group will be held at the Greenville County Library from 10 a.m. to noon. The first general session will begin at 2 p.m. with Dr. Ann Pritchett, University of Tennessee, speaking on "Library Relationships: A Financial Focus." From 3:30 to 5 p.m., the Special Libraries Section and the Two Year College Section will hold their meetings. The day's activities will conclude with the convention reception at the Greenville County Museum of Art from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m.

On Friday morning, the Beta Omega Chapter (USC) of Beta Phi Mu will hold its first breakfast meeting from 7:30 - 9:00 a.m. At 9:00 a.m., a joint meeting of the Administration, Public Library, Public Services, and Trustee sections will feature Bob Walton of the Texas State Library on "Microcomputer Applications for Libraries." The College and University and Technical Services sections will hold a joint session at 11 a.m. Miriam Drake, Assistant Director of Library Support Services, Purdue University, and Chair of the OCLC Users Council, will speak on "Library Relations and the Political Environment."

Rudy Mancke, Curator of Natural History, South Carolina Museum Commission, will be the guest speaker at the luncheon sponsored by JMRT at 12:30 p.m. His topic will be "Satisfying Curiosity: Libraries and Museums." During the afternoon, meetings for the following sections will be held: Administration, Services for Children and Youth in School and Public Libraries, Archives and Special Collections Round Table, and the On-Line Users Interest Group. From 4-6 p.m., a tour of the Bob Jones Art Gallery will be offered.

Carol Nemeyer, Associate Librarian for National Programs at the Library of Congress, and Past President of the American Library Association, will be the featured banquet speaker on Friday evening. She will talk on "Strengthening Library Connections."

On Saturday morning, JMRT will hold their program and business meeting at 9 a.m., and the Trustee Section will conduct their business meeting at 9:30 a.m. "Changing the Image of Librarians in the 80's" will be addressed at the third general session by speaker Ann White, Library Supervisor for Spartanburg District 3 at 10 a.m. The SCLA business meeting will immediately follow, concluding at noon.

PRE-CONFERENCE ON BIBLIOGRAPHIC INSTRUCTION

"The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly: Improving the One-Hour Bibliographic Instruction Lecture" will be the theme of a SCLA pre-conference workshop to be sponsored by the Bibliographic Instruction Interest Group on October 13, 1983 from 10 a.m. to noon at the Greenville Public Library. Trish Ridgeway, Head of the Reference Department at Winthrop College, will present a demonstration lecture for the first hour and a video tape of good and bad instruction during the second hour. School, academic, and other librarians who make educational presentations are invited to attend.

SCLA FRIEND OF LIBRARIES AWARD

Each year, the South Carolina Library Association accepts nominations for its Friend of Libraries Award which seeks to recognize a lay person who has given unselfishly of his time and talents in the support of South Carolina's school, public, or academic libraries for a sustained period. Nominations of friends of school and academic libraries are particularly encouraged. Any member of the South Carolina Library Association can make a nomination by sending a letter of recommendation accompanied by a concise statement of the nominee's specific contributions which demonstrate his or her distinguished service to libraries to: SCLA Publicity Committee, c/o William C. Nominations for the 1983 award, which will be presented at the Association's annual convention this fall in Greenville, should be submitted by August 15, 1983.

Public Library Notes

Aiken County: The Aiken County Literacy Council recently donated a basic collection of books for adult new readers to the library.

Berkeley County: Impressionistic paintings by Summerville artist Donald Haas were exhibited at the library recently.

Chester County: Actor Charlton Heston gave a series of dramatic readings on July 10 to benefit the library's building fund drive. Tickets for "An Evening with Charlton Heston" were priced at a minimum of \$25 each, and \$3,750 was raised by the event. Mr. Heston was in Chester during the filming of the miniseries, "Chiefs."...The library sponsored an exhibit of over 500 photographs depicting Chester County in the early 1900's. Over 200 people attended the opening of the exhibit on June 9.

Chesterfield County: Proceeds from Chesterfield County's "Talent Night" to be held August 11 will be donated to the library's building fund.

Clarendon County: The library's building fund received a \$5,000 contribution from the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department. The library plans to offer a special area and special programming devoted to South Carolina's natural heritage in the new building.

Greenwood County: The Self Foundation has given a \$30,000 challenge grant to aid in construction of a library branch in Ninety-Six. The proposed 3,100 square foot structure is estimated to cost approximately \$160,000. About half of the total funds have already been raised.

Kershaw County: Beginning on June 20, the library began offering a free course on "Introduction to Microcomputers" to the general public (age 6 or older). The program is a cooperative project involving the library, the Friends group, and Sumter Technical College. Sumter TEC is furnishing the microcomputer and the course instructor. The instructor's fees are being underwritten by the Friends of the Library. Each two-session, four-hour course is limited to three persons.

Lexington County: During July, the library began its "Coffee and Cinema" series at three library locations. The film series carried the theme, "The Making of America."

Oconee County: On June 23, the library presented an oral history slide/tape presentation entitled "Speaking of History...Sounds and Scenes in the Tri-County Pendleton District." The oral history project received partial financial support from the South Carolina Committee for the Humanities.

Pickens County: The library has begun loaning Polaroid instant cameras to patrons 18 or older for a two-week period.

Spartanburg County: The library will lease the former Lyman Municipal Hall to serve as a branch library for the areas of Lyman, Duncan and Wellford. The library is presently conducting a drive to raise funds to renovate and expand the building...The Spartanburg County Council recently approved \$112,000 in order to establish a new library branch in Boiling Springs. The branch will be housed in a portion of the Palmetto Health Center. Additional financial support is being provided by state government and local organizations. The library branch is scheduled to open in early 1984.

Union County: The library building fund-raising committee recently announced that they have surpassed their initial goal of \$67,000. A \$45,000 grant from the Governor's Office was made on June 2, and the library plans to apply for a \$100,000 LSCA grant from the South Carolina State Library. The committee plans to raise a total of \$480,000 to expand and renovate the present library building.

Focusing on Serving Children

BOOK INVADER NEWS

Darlington County Library inaugurated its Book Invader program with a story contest in the schools. Several children won prizes for stories they wrote about Book Invader. The library will also offer special reading programs for junior and senior high school students with rewards offered by the schools.

Pickens County Library is doing outreach programs at sites throughout the county in connection with summer reading. The programs include films, storytelling and creative dramatics.

At the Landrum Branch of the Spartanburg County Library there was a Book Invader parade, and awards for costumes were presented to participants. After reading ten books the children can get a special assignment from Ron the Robot.

Chester County Library's program this summer includes a visit from Don Winslow of Riverbanks Zoo, a mime, and a puppet show.

Marion County Library held computer demonstrations at Marion and Mullins libraries in connection with Book Invader programs.

Lancaster County Library's final summer program will feature local personality Wendell Rowell and will be partly broadcast over WPAJ. Other programs will feature a visitor from Riverbanks Zoo, a ventriloquist, and films and stories.

Summerville Public Library (Dorchester County) programs this summer included a guest storyteller, an airplane pilot, a computer demonstration and a visit by the police. Preschool story hours were retitled "Invader Landing" for the summer. The library is also having contests for children to construct a space creature or spaceship.

Outfitted in a Book Invader costume made by his wife, Philip Cheney, Director of the Florence County Library, was the featured performer at children's programs in two of the branch libraries. He accompanied himself on the guitar and involved the audience in singing folk and "play party" songs. He also sang the ballad of John Henry after the Ezra Jack Keats version of John Henry had been shared with the children. Jane McGregor, Extension Children's Librarian, urges other libraries not to overlook staff talent from the director on down when planning children's activities.

As part of the Book Invader promotion at the Berkeley County Library, staff members are wearing their Book Invader T-shirts one day each week on a designated T-shirt day.

At the Hampton County Library, Book Invader programs for children ages 6 to 14 have had such a good response they have had to schedule three sessions each week.

OTHER LIBRARY PROGRAMS

Lexington County Circulating Library is having a series of "Movies to Munch by" at all branches beginning July 18. Children six years and older are invited to bring a snack and eat as they watch children's films.

CHOPSTICK THEATER

NOTE: Jane McGregor sent this article after an exciting week of performances in June. Jane Gardner from the State Library was able to see one of the performances and would agree that it was an exciting and excellently done dramatization of children's literature.

The first few chapters of The Phantom Tollbooth by Norton Jester came alive for over 200 children and adults who attended the three performances of Chopstick Theater in the Florence County libraries during June. Milo, the Whetherman, Tock the dog who goes "tick," and the Lethargerians were there right before our eyes! Chopstick Theater is composed of two young men, George Altman and Steven Lapre, who share their enthusiasm for books by using a few simple props, puppets, dramatic ability, creative presentation of the words of an author, and the imagination of the children to lead a young audience into a story and stimulate them to finish the story or book on their own. They sincerely enjoy books, like and respect children, and their presentation is highly appropriate for libraries. The actors adapt to any space (or lack of it), pitch in to move tables, chairs, or books, and use whatever is at hand to create an atmosphere that encourages emotional and sometimes physical participation. They do their own adaptation and interpretation of a book or story but

use, almost without change, the words of the author, either as dialogue or straight narrative. They do adult dramatizations, such as their performance of "The Ice Palace" by F. S. Fitzgerald at the Spoleto Festival. They are available for bookings in libraries and schools and would also be excellent resource persons for "residencies" in a community and creative dramatic workshops. READING FOR CHILDREN'S LIBRARIANS

Smardo, Frances A. and Curry, John F. What Research Tells Us About Storyhours and Receptive Language. Dallas Public Library, 1982. (027.625)

A research project exposed groups of children to live, video, film, and no storyhours. Researchers concluded that live stories were the most effective and film storyhours slightly less so. Videotaped story times were not significantly more effective than no storyhours. This book also describes other studies in the area of reading with children with the implication for public library storyhours. State Library Adds Magazine Index

The State Library has added Magazine Index to its reference collection. This computer-output microfilm index covers approximately 400 popular journals, including all titles indexed in Reader's Guide. In addition to its broad coverage, Magazine Index cumulates monthly to include the most recent five years of indexed articles and provides access to articles published as recently as three weeks ago. All journals are indexed from cover-to-cover with special attention given to reviews, product evaluations, editorials, biographical sketches and original literary works. Public libraries that do not subscribe to this index may want to keep it in mind as an excellent source of information on current event topics appearing in popular magazines. Grants Research Collection

The South Carolina State Library, in cooperation with the Junior League of Columbia, has published a brochure describing its "Grants Research Collection." Most of the research materials relating to grantsmanship are located in the reference collection and are available for use in the State Library. The State Library has served as a Regional Collection of the Foundation Center since 1972, thereby receiving all Foundation Center publications and Internal Revenue Service returns filed by South Carolina-based philanthropic foundations. In addition, the library has directories of governmental and corporate grants. General books on fundraising and grantsmanship are available from the circulating collection via interlibrary loan.

STATE AID TO NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC LIBRARIES INCREASED 63%

The North Carolina State Legislature has increased the appropriation for State Aid to Public Libraries by \$3 million for each year of the upcoming 1983-85 biennium. This increase will result in a total annual appropriation of \$7.8 million for the state's public libraries. The narrative supporting the appropriation stated that the increase will allow "for implementation of a new and more equitable formula for distributing State Aid to Public Libraries funds." This new formula will especially benefit the less affluent, rural areas of the state. The State Aid increase was the result of a two-year campaign led by the chairman of the State House and Senate appropriations committees, with major support coming from the North Carolina Library Association, the North Carolina State Library, the Public Library Directors Association, and the Friends of North Carolina Public Libraries in cooperation with its 57 affiliate local Friends organizations.

SOLINET TO OFFER DISCOUNTED ONLINE RETRIEVAL

SOLINET is now offering access to the online information services of Bibliographic Retrieval Services (BRS) and DIALOG Information Services at discounted rates through its Affiliated Information Retrieval Service.

Optional rate schedules based on number of guaranteed hours of use are as follows: for BRS - a base connect hour rate of \$16 an hour with a guarantee of 36 hours or a base connect rate of \$25 per hour with no guarantee of usage; for DIALOG - an \$8 per hour discount off base connect hour rate with guarantee of 48 hours per year or \$3 per hour discount off base connect rate with guarantee of 24 hours per year. An annual administrative fee of \$150 is also charged to SOLINET members for the first password with additional charges of \$30 for each additional password.

LITERACY CHECKLIST

"Literacy Resources: An Annotated Check List for Tutors and Librarians," published by the Enoch Pratt Free Library, Baltimore, is available for purchase from the library. Compiled by Jane-Carol Heiser, Literacy Resources Librarian, the 144 page, soft-cover book covers a selection of materials in the library collection which have proved most useful in the library's literacy program and to the clients of its Literacy Resources Center.

The bibliography is divided by topic into seven sections: basic English and study skills, basic reading, English as a second language, GED, leisure reading, life skills, and mathematics. In addition, it includes a chapter on tutor resources offering "practical materials for lesson ideas, activities, and enrichment," and listing other reference books, documents, and articles on related subjects. REMINISCENCES ABOUT NANCY C. BLAIR

She was a "gem of purest ray serene." Miss Blair would not have appreciated hearing that phrase in reference to herself since she always used it in the pejorative sense about someone else. But she was a gem and we all learned a lot from her. In remembering Nancy Blair, the first thing that comes to mind was her masterful use of the English language and her unique ability to turn a phrase. As newcomers to the library staff, we never tired of listening to her descriptions of both her own and the experiences of others in the counties she visited. Her stories might relate either to library activities or simply to what happened to be going on in the community. Neither will we forget her devotion to her pets, among them the most distinguished looking lavender Siamese cat we have ever seen.

But more important to Miss Blair was her pioneering work in the development of library service in South Carolina. Indelibly etched in our memory is a picture of Miss Blair taken in front of the first bookmobile in Richland County. From 1934-1940, Miss Blair was active in the statewide WPA library project along with Miss Lois Barbare, Mrs. Lucy Hampton Bostick, and others. She was director of the project from 1940 until its demise in 1943. At that time she became the first executive secretary of the S. C. State Library Board and served in that capacity until 1946 when she became the librarian of the Spartanburg County Library. She returned to the State Library Board in 1959 where she worked as a field staff librarian and at different times, as consultant for children's services, construction projects, and institutional libraries as well as editor of the State Library's newsletter. Miss Blair served as president of the South Carolina Library Association in 1951. She retired from the State Library in 1972, after which she became active with her local church groups and with the Austin Wilkes Society. Nancy Blair has now "departed this station", to use another favorite phrase of hers, but for those who loved her and learned so much from her, she will never be forgotten.

...Nancy Blair died on June 13, 1983.

Ellett of Atlanta, Georgia will assume the position of cataloger on August 17. A native of Greenville, Mr. Ellett is a graduate of Davidson College and holds the M. Ln. from Emory University. He is currently employed as the head of the cataloging department at the Cooperative College Library Center in Atlanta.

Barbara Kasper of Bloomington, Indiana, will join the Field Services staff on September 2. Mrs. Kasper holds the A.B. and M.L.S. degrees from Indiana Univeristy where she is completing Ph.D. requirements this summer. She has been a public library director in Indiana, instructor at the Indiana University School of Library and Information Science, and visiting professor at the University of Alberta Library School. She is presently employed as a consultant with the Indiana State Library.
