



DJJ Enters New Partnership

On Monday, February 20, DJJ along with Clemson University's Youth Learning Institute and Columbia College held a press conference to announce a partnership that will help students who are not succeeding in traditional classroom settings. Under an existing partnership with Clemson University, the Department refers some of its non-violent students to a university operated alternative placement program in Aiken County.

While, the press conference was held on a state holiday, DJJ was well represented by staff including three of our teachers who are graduates of the Columbia College program. They are Belinda Mceachern and Karen Herring of Willow Lane School, and Gloria Fluker, Birchwood School.

Under the new partnership, Columbia College will offer its master's of education degree in Divergent Learning in Aiken, allowing graduate students to walk out of a lecture and immediately into an environment where theory can be applied. The first class is expected to start in May.

Arts in Education Curricular Grant

DJJ's School District has been approved to receive a \$10,500 grant to implement an arts integration curriculum in our schools. The grant was awarded by the South Carolina Department of Education and will be used by DJJ teachers for professional development arts institutes during the summer.
