First Steps to School Readiness Strategy Areas

The First Steps initiative approaches children's school readiness needs in five ways:

Family Strengthening: A parent is a child's first and best teacher. First Steps works to help parents become the best parents they can be. First Steps also helps parents further their own education.

Healthy Start: Children's development and ability to learn are profoundly impacted by their health in the earliest years. First Steps works to help families understand children's health needs through education and screenings while also working to help them access needed health services.

Quality Child Care: Quality child care provides immediate and long-term learning benefits for children. First Steps works to expand the availability of quality child-care to families and to enhance the level of quality in existing child-care environments.

Early Education: Research shows that children who participate in high-quality preschool classes are more likely to start school ready to learn, as well as be more successful later in life. First Steps works to expand high-quality 3-year-old and 4-year-old kindergarten opportunities in public and private settings.

School Transition: The transition into kindergarten is a critical time that sets the tone for children's perspectives about the school years, as well their parents' perspectives. Making a strong initial connection between school and home -- and supporting both parents and students during this transition time -- has been shown to impact students' later school success and parents' later involvement during the school years.

2007-08 County Partnership Programs by Strategy

FAMILY STRENGTHENING

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Book Program

Program Description: Founded by Dolly Parton in 1988, the Dolly Parton Imagination Library provides age-appropriate books to children age birth to 5 years. Many children receiving books might not otherwise have quality books at their reading level in their homes. Children who are registered in their local community are mailed one book per month through their fifth birthday. The annual cost per child is only \$30 or around \$2.50 per month. The initiative in Chesterfield County is supported solely by local funds.

Program Results:

- ❖ 4,772 books were distributed to children deemed economically as living in poverty,
- ❖ On average, 388 children received a book each month.
- ❖ All Child Care Quality Enhancement centers participated in this program.
- ❖ Collaborate with the local health department to identify eligible children and the county post offices to ensure books are delivered to participants. This collaborative effort safeguards the resources utilized to purchase and mail the books by identifying invalid or changes in addresses.
- ❖ A random survey indicates that 98% of participants are extremely satisfied with the program.

HEALTHY START

Jumpstart to Good Health

Program Description: -Through a grant from the Chesterfield County Coordinating Council (funded by the Department of Health and Human Services), and in collaboration with community partners, Chesterfield First Steps implemented an evidenced based health prevention program that will curb and reduce the risk of childhood obesity in young children. The program began in late January 2008 and will conclude in December 2008. This collaboration will attempt to achieve four overall goals:

- 1) Improve health knowledge and reduce risk of obesity for 40 to 60 children 2, 3, and 4 years old.
- 2) Improve the nutrition and physical activity environment at four child care centers in Chesterfield County.
- 3) Effect positive healthy lifestyle changes by families with young children.
- 4) Engage the Chesterfield County community in a health care prevention message for young children.

Program Results:

Goals and outcomes:

1. 75% of children Body Mass Index (BMI) will remain or improve to Healthy 2010 standards:
 - ❖ *Baseline BMI on 75 children was conducted in February and will be measured again in November 2008).*
 - ❖ *Baseline BMI showed that one-third of the children screened were overweight or obese.*
2. Improve the nutrition and physical activity environment at four child care centers-Each child care center will make a 50% improvement on the ERS (Environment Rating Scale) on measures related to nutrition and physical:
 - ❖ *All four participating centers are meeting USDA guidelines according to the ERS assessment.*
3. Basic knowledge of healthy eating and the importance of daily physical activity will improve by 20%.
 - ❖ *(Baseline survey was conducted in February with families, post survey will be conducted in November 2008).*
 - ❖ *123 children (birth to five years old) in four child care centers participate in the program.*
 - ❖ *75 children (ages 2, 3, and 4) received Body Mass Index screenings; one-third of children were assessed to be overweight or obese.*
 - ❖ *20 child care staff at 4 child care centers attended the nutrition training by a registered dietician for 3.5 hours approved with the Center for Child Care Career Development. Covered the USDA program, nutrients needed for successful growth and development, menu planning, and instituting nutrition policies in the centers.*
 - ❖ *40 child care staff/4 child care centers participated in the certified training Color Me Healthy by DHEC Regional Masters Health Educator.*
 - ❖ *YMCA will be providing physical education recommendations.*

- ❖ *Registered dietician provides menu consultation to the 4 child care centers and assist in the preparation of menus for 4 weeks. Dietician assessed menus for portion, size, food quality, and nutrients. New menus are implemented to meet USDA recommended standards.*

QUALITY CHILD CARE

Program Description: Contracted with Thompson Child & Family Focus Program to provide technical assistance to child care providers in Chesterfield County to:

1. Increase the providers’ and educators’ understanding of core knowledge and competencies that will help to improve their ability to administer and provide quality early care and education.
2. Enhance the overall quality of early care and education provided to infants, toddlers, and preschool children.
3. Enhance the overall program administration of early care and education facilities.
4. Ensure accountability in the use of child care grant funds, and project evaluation.

Program Results: Steady Steps Quality Enhancement

- ❖ *6 child care centers received individualized technical assistance from one Program Quality Specialist (PQS).*
- ❖ *427 children were impacted and 79 child care providers were served.*
- ❖ *5 CCCCDC approved in-service trainings were offered totaling 24 hours.*
- ❖ *73 child care providers attended the in-service trainings.*
- ❖ *750 contact hours were provided to childcare providers in their natural environment.*
- ❖ *Enhanced meals and snacks and gross motor play at four child care centers.*
- ❖ *3 child care centers achieved an overall ERS score of 4.0.*
- ❖ *2 child care centers increased their overall ERS scores by almost 2 points (.5 is considered scientifically significant).*
- ❖ *Post-ERS assessment scores from the ECERS-R classrooms reveal an average Interaction score of 5.4.*

- ❖ *All centers made significant improvements in various areas on the ERS such as: staff to child interactions, provisions for parents, free play, and music and movement.*
- ❖ *Conducted 9 Directors' forums countywide and 9 child care directors attended all forums. Resources provided during the forums were used by directors to strengthen administrative skills.*

Quality Child Care Expansion Project

Partnership Goal – To create access to quality, model child care in the county where services are most needed thus will allowing more children to start school ready to learn and be successful in school.

Program Results:

- ❖ *Awarded a grant to First Presbyterian Child Development Center in February 2007.*
- ❖ *Provided the center with 120 hours of technical assistance by a qualified program quality specialist.*
- ❖ *Technical assistance provided in child care environment-room. Arrangement, selection of early care and education product and licensing process.*
- ❖ *Center opened and obtained licensure in August 2007.*
- ❖ *Center participates in the ABC's 10 ABC scholarship children*
- ❖ *Center participated in the Directors' Networking Forum, the Resource Center and the Jumpstart to Good Health program.*
- ❖ *Center scored 6 (6 out of 7) in these areas of the ERS: Encouraging children to communicate, Provisions for parents, Staff interactions and cooperation, Free play, Sand and Water, Music and Movement.*

Resource Center at Northeastern Technical College

Partnership Goal – The First Steps Resource Center (FSRC) provides parents and professionals that work with young children, access to information and materials that enhance early learning opportunities. The resources and services of the FSRC affect the daily lives of young children directly by providing equipment such as a laminator; Ellison die cut machine, copy machine, and paper cutter. In addition, space is provided to create inexpensive materials to be used with young children and their families. Other materials such as props (multicultural toys, dolls, prop boxes) as well as resources (books, math and science materials, and puppets) may be checked out by the early childhood professionals (child care center and homes and part day preschools), early childhood students, early interventionists and parents.

Program Results:

- ❖ *Partnership with Northeastern Technical College to provide space and other in-kind support for the Resource Center.*
- ❖ *Partnership with the county library to reduce geographic barrier of accessing the Resource Center. Resource Center items may be returned to any county library.*
- ❖ *8 child care teachers and directors use the Resource Center and approximately 100 children are being impacted within these centers.*
- ❖ *14 Northeastern Technical College students/parents are use the Resource Center*
- ❖ *30 parents use the Resource Center which impacts 37 children.*
- ❖ *Approximately 350 children are being impacted by 2 primary schools use of FSRC.*
- ❖ *7 workshops held with parents at the FSRC.*

- ❖ 2,685 items were checked out of the FRSC
- ❖ The Resource Center has 54 active members.
- ❖ The Resource Center is impacting overall at least 499 children.

EARLY EDUCATION.

S.C. Child Development Education Pilot Program (CDEPP) Program description: CDEPP offers state-paid tuition for 4-year-old children living in one the 37 trial and plaintiff school districts involved in the school funding equity lawsuit, *Abbeville et al. vs. South Carolina*. First Steps oversees CDEPP 4K classes offered in private child care centers and Head Start. To qualify for state-paid tuition, a student’s family must qualify for TANF or free/reduced-price lunch, be age 4 by Sept. 1, and live in one of the eligible school districts.

Program Results:

- ❖ *One child care center in Chesterfield County participated in CDEPP, the Quality Enhancement program, the Resource Center, and the Jumpstart to Good Health program*
- ❖ *Nine students participated in the CDEPP and received at least 180 days of four year old preschool.*
- ❖ *Transportation was provided for 2 students through a collaboration with Chesterfield County School District.*

COUNTY DATA SNAPSHOT

In FY08, First Steps County Partnerships statewide made it a priority to become increasingly data-driven. County Partnerships successfully began using powerful new components of the First Steps data system, and County Partnerships also utilized data in new ways to drive their FY09 program plans. In addition to enhanced program data tracking, County Partnerships are also focusing on the best available data about children and families to best understand their communities' needs. At the end of FY08 and the beginning of FY09, County Partnerships began an extensive analysis of this data, including data about the risk factors known to impact children's potential school success, such as low birth weight, teen mothers, and families living in poverty. A county-level risk data report is included in the subsequent pages of this report.

The indicators reveal major progress has been made, in some cases more than has occurred in surrounding counties or the state. The bad news is that the numbers of children dropping out of school and those not ready for school are still too high. 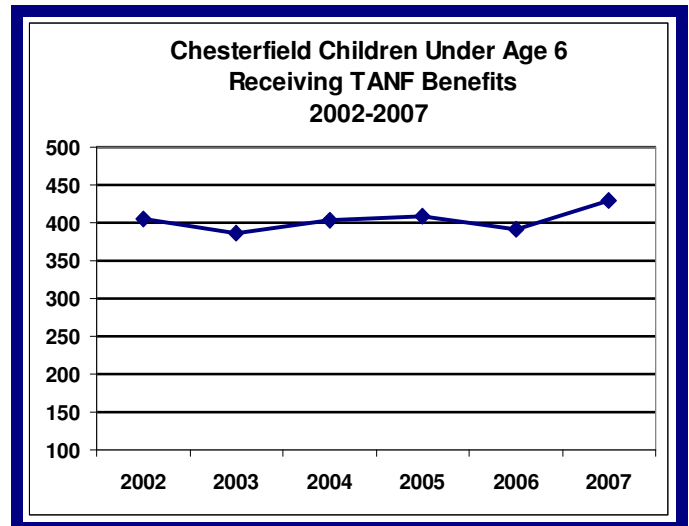
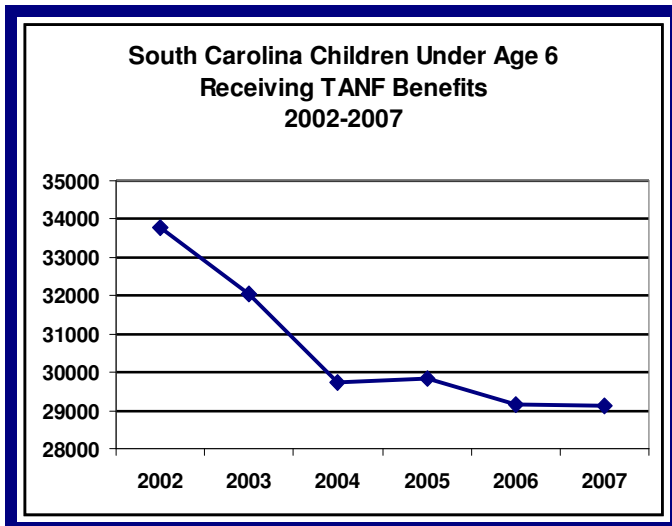
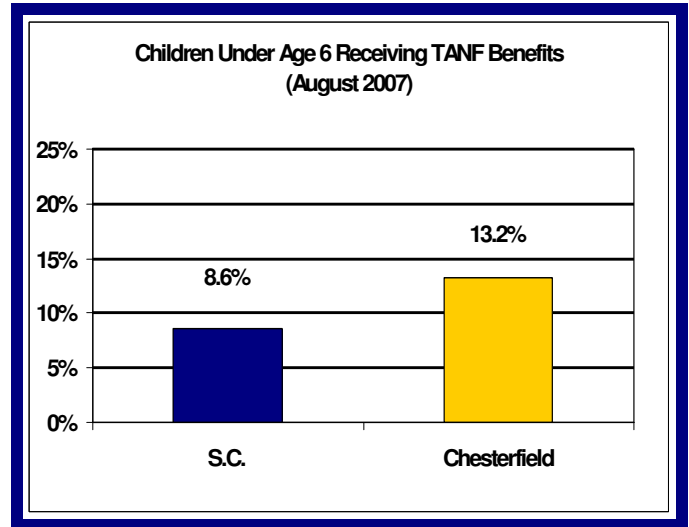
CHILD POVERTY (Children in Families Receiving TANF Benefits)

Fast Fact: Roughly 1 in 8 Chesterfield County children has an annual family income equivalent to \$10,325 (or less) for a family of four. A recent statewide analysis suggests that 45% of these children will be retained or score at the "below basic" level (PACT) by third grade.

Children in deep poverty often face a wide variety of school readiness obstacles, ranging from inadequate prenatal care and nutrition to low maternal education.

429 of Chesterfield County's 3,240 children under age 6 received federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits during 2007, indicating a family income at or below 50% of the federal poverty definition.

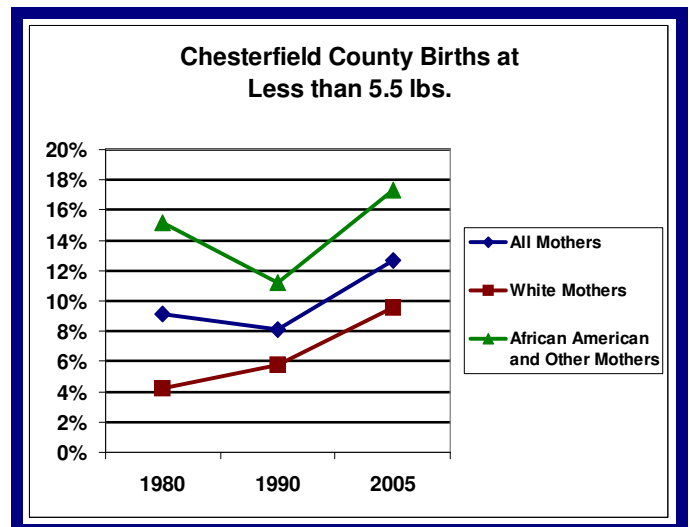
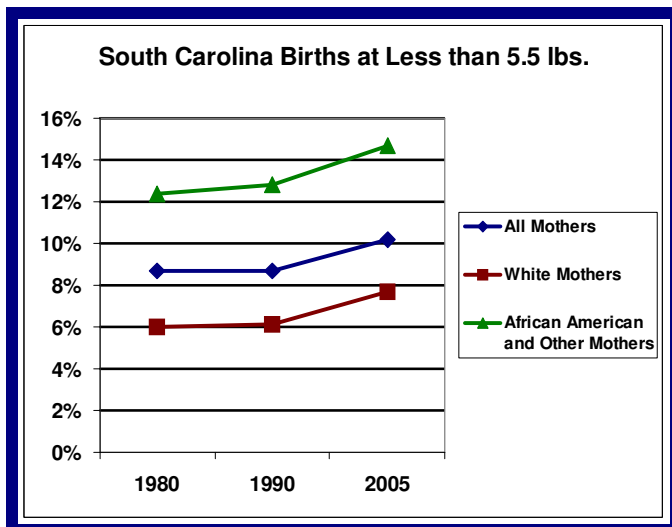
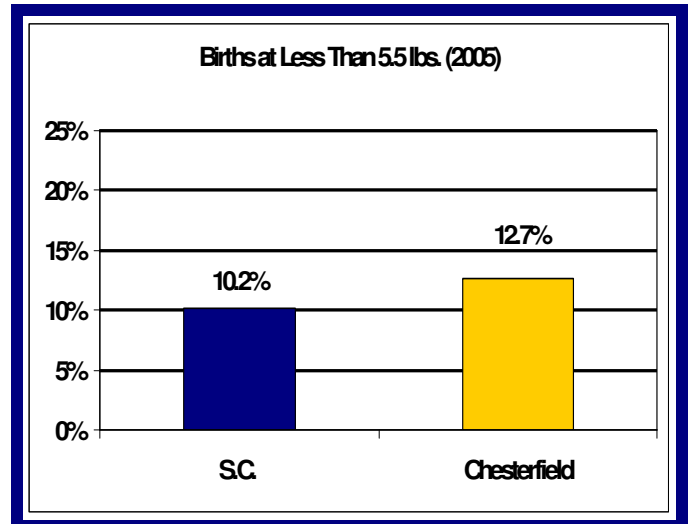
Chesterfield County (2005): 12.7%

Fast Fact: Roughly 1 in 8 Chesterfield County children is born at a weight less than 5.5 lbs. A recent statewide analysis suggests that at least one-third of these children (36%-52% depending on weight category) will be retained or score at the "below basic" level (PACT) by third grade.

Babies born at low weights are often prone to developmental delays associated with early academic failure.

Many have received inadequate prenatal care and suffer from significant health complications.

68 of the 534 children born in Chesterfield County during 2005 weighed less than 5.5 lbs.

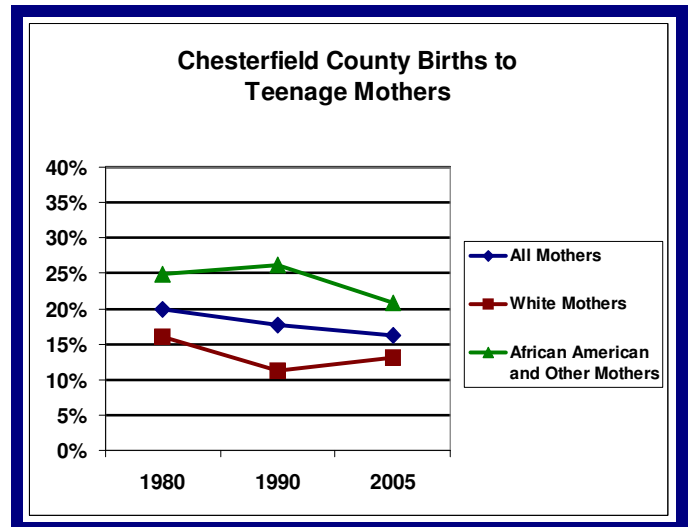
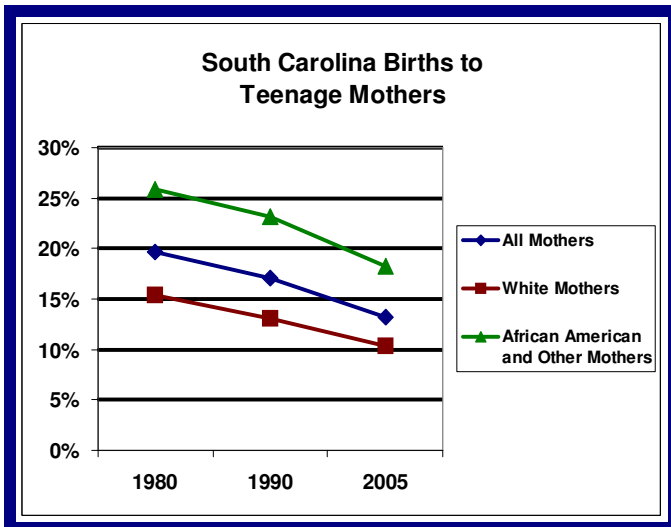
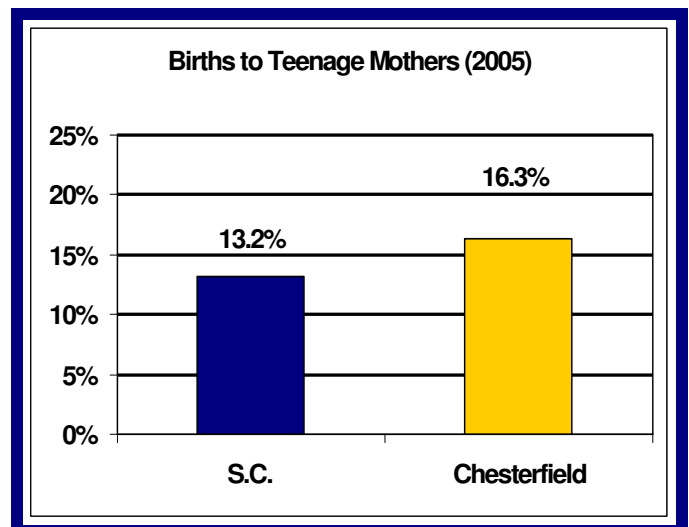

Fast Fact: Just over 1 in 6 Chesterfield County births is to a mother under 20 years of age. A recent statewide analysis suggests that 43% of these children will be retained or score at the “below basic” level (PACT) by third grade.

Teenage parents often lack the maturity and knowledge required to optimally fulfill important parental responsibilities, are less likely to advance their own educational attainment and often fail to advance beyond low-income status.

87 of the 534 children born in Chesterfield County during 2005 had teenage mothers.

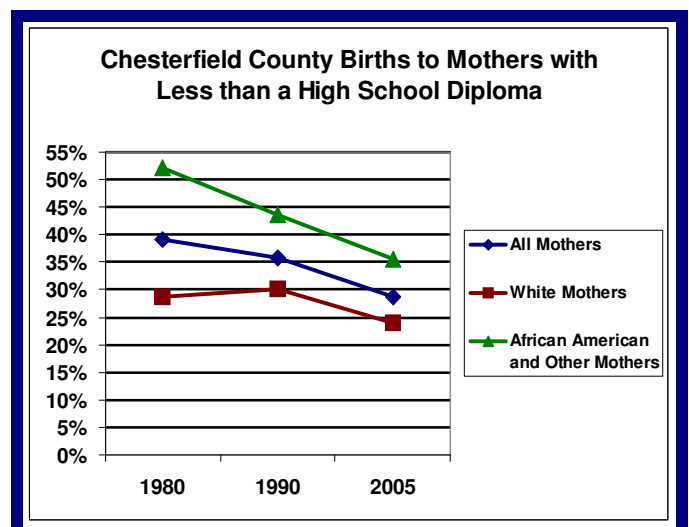

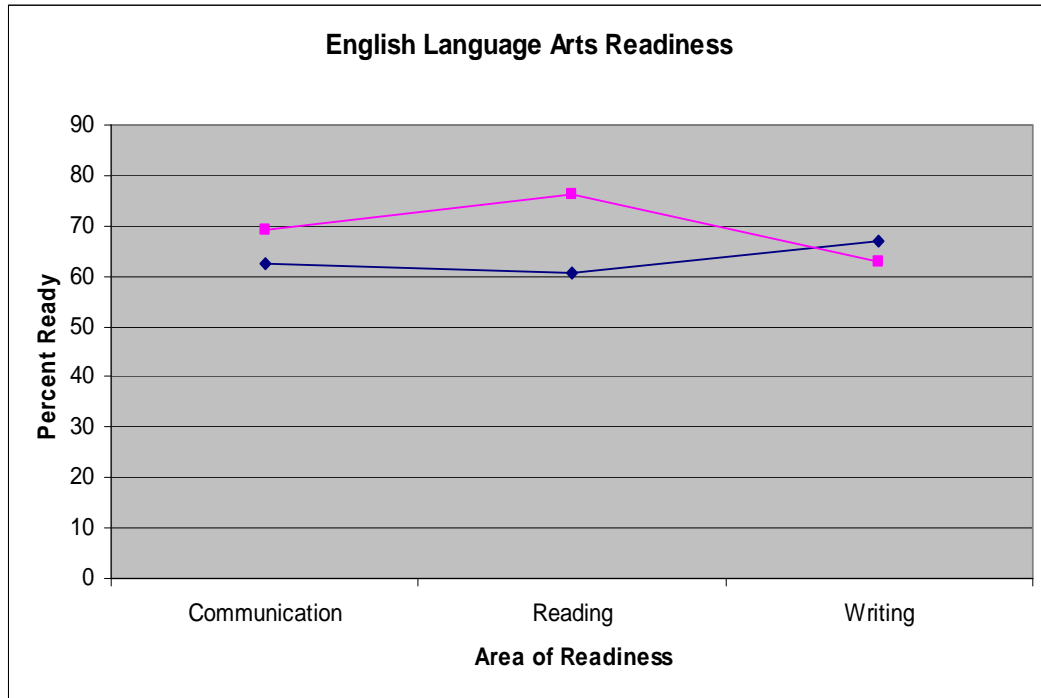

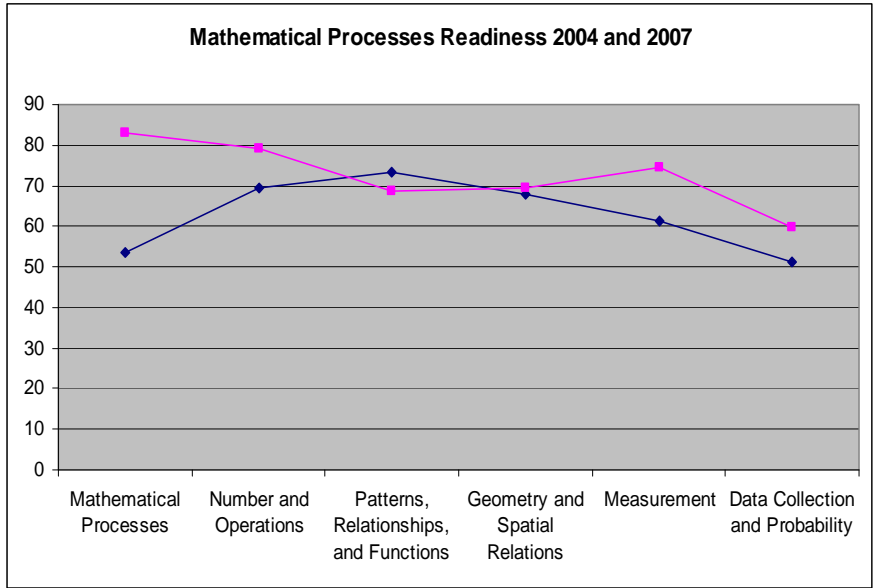

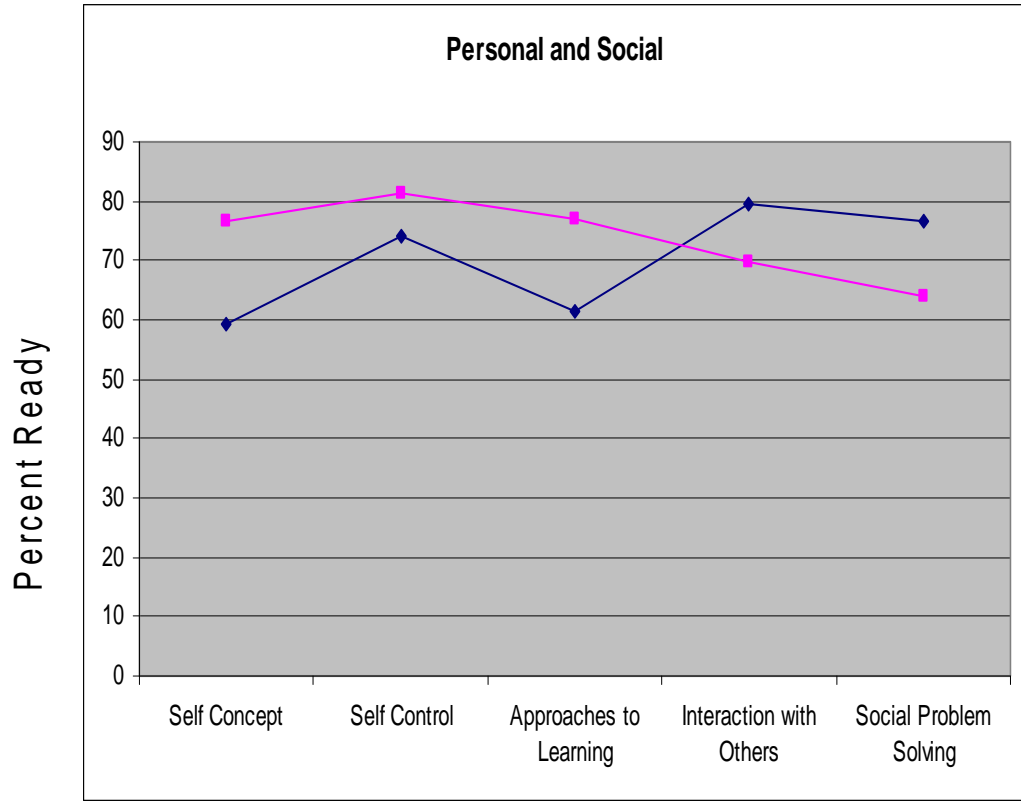
