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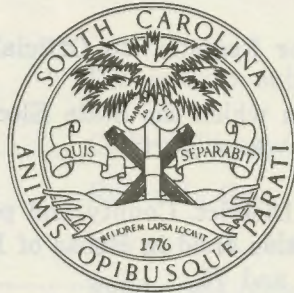

STATE BOARD OF CANVASSERS

PRESENT: G. P. Callison, Chairman; Martha C. Chapman, Vice-Chairman; Ruben L. Gray; Margaret S. Townsend; and James B. Ellisor, Executive Director.

The State Board of Canvassers met on December 11, 1975, in the offices of the State Election Commission at 11:00 a.m. Mr. Callison called the meeting to order.

Mr. Ellisor advised that he had received the Statement and Return of Votes from the Richland County Board of Canvassers for the election to fill a vacancy in House District No. 76 held on December 2, 1975. He advised that the results had been checked and appeared to be in order.

STATE BOARD OF CANVASSERS

PRESENT: G. P. Callison, Chairman; Martha C. Chapman, Vice Chairman; Ruben L. Gray; Raymond A. Harris; Margaret S. Townsend and James B. Ellisor, Executive Director.

The State Board of Canvassers met on December 22, 1975 in the offices of the State Election Commission at 11:00 a.m.

Mr. Callison called the meeting to order and asked if there were any corrections or additions to the Minutes of the last meeting.

Mrs. Chapman moved that the Minutes of the last meeting be approved.

Mrs. Townsend seconded the motion and it was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Callison asked Mr. Ellisor to proceed with the business to be brought before the Board.

Mr. Ellisor advised that he had received the Statements and Return of Votes from the Clarendon and Sumter County Boards of Canvassers for the election to fill a vacancy in House District No. 67 held on December 16, 1975. He advised that the results had been checked and appeared to be in order.

The members of State Board of Canvassers then canvassed the results and, finding them in order, certified the results as complete and correct. The total votes certified were as follows:

J. Q. Ross .....	276
Write-In .....	14

Mr. Callison stated that the results of this canvass reflected that Charles L. Griffin had been elected to the office of House of Representatives for House District No. 67. He further

stated that these results would become final at noon, December 27, 1975, if no protest was filed by that time and a certification to this effect was made by the members of the Board to the Secretary of State.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting recessed subject to call of the Chair. Unless there was a protest filed in the above election within the next five days, no further meeting of the State Board of Canvassers would be held at this time.

## HISTORY OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION

The State Election Commission became a separate state agency on January 1, 1969. It had formerly functioned as a division of the office of Secretary of State. It was the feeling of the General Assembly that voter registration and the administration of elections were matters that should be removed from possible influence of partisan, elected officials and placed under the custody of a non-elected, bipartisan board or commission. By the law which created the Election Commission, it was required that the Commission be composed of at least one member of the majority political party represented in the General Assembly and at least one member of the largest minority political party represented in the General Assembly.

The State Election Commission operates under authority granted by 1968 Act No. 955, which is codified as Sections 23-30, et. seq., of the 1962 South Carolina Code of Laws, as amended.

### ORGANIZATION OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION

#### I. *Administration*

The functions of the Election Commission are administered by a five-member commission, which meets monthly in Columbia, and by an executive director who is the chief administrative officer of the agency. Policy, procedures and rules governing the various functions of the Commission are set by the election commissioners and carried out by the executive director. The executive director employs and maintains a competent working staff to assist him in carrying out his duties. During statewide general election years, it is necessary to employ additional personnel in order to carry out the increased responsibilities of the Election Commission at that time.

The Election Commission also considers and recommends changes in the Registration and Election laws to the Committee to Study the Election Laws of South Carolina in the General Assembly.

## II. *Central Voter Registration System*

The Election Commission is the coordinating center of South Carolina's computerized system of voter registration. All forty-six (46) counties report new registrations and registration changes to the central office, where a computer file is built and from which are printed new lists of registered voters for every election that is held in the State—state, county, municipal or other. This system is responsible for removing from the rolls of voters those persons who have died, moved, been convicted of certain crimes or otherwise become ineligible as electors. In this regard, reports must be obtained from other federal, state and local agencies and compared with the computer files. Detailed records and statistics are maintained on the number of registered voters in each county and precinct of South Carolina. Also, a voter history file is maintained on every election held in South Carolina.

All forms and materials used by the central office and the county boards of registration for voter registration are printed and paid for by the Election Commission. The central system also provides as a public service the sale of precinct lists of registered voters at a reasonable cost to any registered elector.

## III. *Aid to Counties*

The Election Commission is charged by law with the responsibility of disbursing to all counties a state supplemental appropriation to aid in keeping the board of registration office open during normal courthouse hours. The amount received by the counties is based upon their respective populations.

## IV. *Elections*

### A. *Office of Elections*

The State Election Commission is the chief election office for the conduct of general and special elections.

This office prints and distributes for statewide gen-

eral election and countywide special elections all ballots, forms and other materials necessary to conduct such elections for Presidential Electors, State Officers, United States Senators, Members of Congress and Constitutional Amendments.

#### B. State Board of Canvassers

After the conclusion of state and county general elections, the five commissioners of the Election Commission act as the State Board of Canvassers. The Board certifies the results of elections and hears appeals and protests arising in such elections.

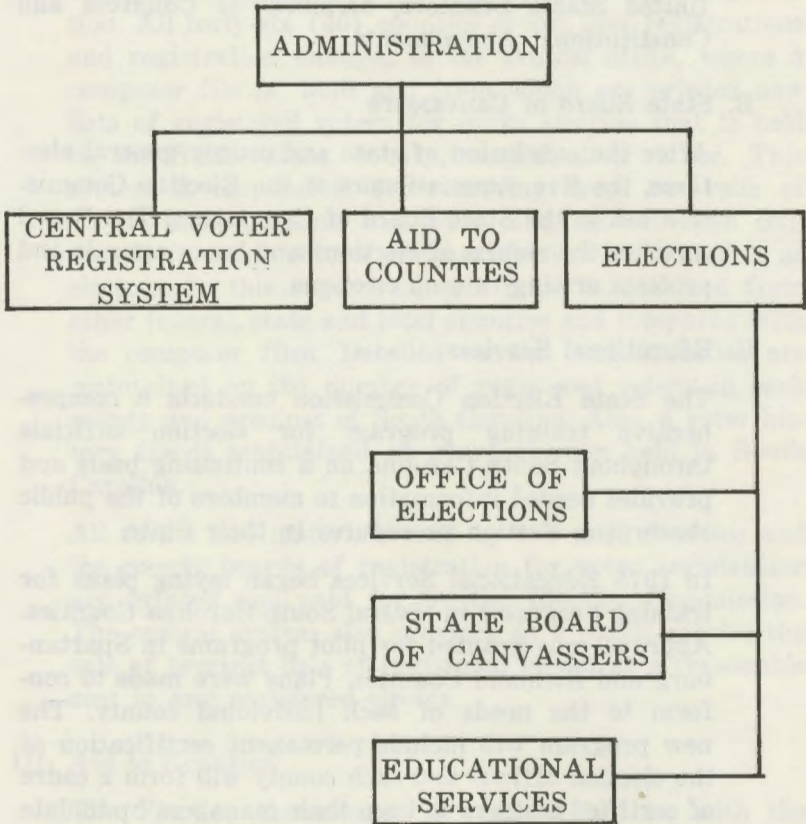
#### C. Educational Services

The State Election Commission conducts a comprehensive training program for election officials throughout South Carolina on a continuing basis and provides needed information to members of the public concerning election procedures in their State.

In 1975 Educational Services began laying plans for training programs in several South Carolina Counties. Approval was granted for pilot programs in Spartanburg and Richland Counties. Plans were made to conform to the needs of each individual county. The new program will include permanent certification of the election official and each county will form a cadre of certified trainers to keep their managers up-to-date on new election procedures.

It is the hope of the State Election Commission that programs of this kind will spread to other counties with good results. Educational Services will continue to provide training for any county or municipality that requests their services.

## WORKSHOP FOR REGISTRATION OFFICIALS

On June 30, 1976, the State Election Commission sponsored a workshop for registration officials. All board members and clerks of the respective County Boards of Voter Registration were requested to attend this meeting.

The workshop was held in an effort to help the Boards organize and gain information on registration procedures and discuss common problems.

The workshop was basically broken down into two classes and one group meeting. The first class dealt with policy and legal problems involved in voter registration. The second class covered the clerical procedures that must be followed in order to make the central voter registration system work properly. In the final session, the Boards discussed common problems and made suggestions as to how voter registration may be improved on both the State and county level.

Each Board member was given a booklet entitled "Manual of Instruction for Voter Registration." It provides working information on clerical procedures to be followed in processing voters and also pertinent provisions from the Registration and Election laws.

Later each County Board of Voter Registration was provided with a booklet entitled "Selected Legal Opinions and Correspondence." This booklet is to be used by the Board for guidance in handling registration problems.

There was a large response to the workshop. Many of the Board members and clerks expressed a desire to attend other such meetings.

**J. ALLEN MARTIN—vs—JAMES B. ELLISOR, 2nd SUIT**

On March 16, 1976, the South Carolina State Supreme Court ruled that the State Election Commission must make copies of the computer tapes that contain the names of registered voters available to any qualified elector in the State at a reasonable cost.

7. "Manual of Instruction for Voter Registration" was prepared for all members of the County Boards of Voter Registration. It outlines all clerical procedures to be followed for voter registration. This booklet will be updated periodically.
