A panel of educators and community leaders joined State Superintendent of Education Mick Zais to discuss how South Carolina's career and technology teachers and career centers are connecting the classroom to the world of work by providing students real-world experience and access to technical certificate programs.

Using a coordinated school health approach, many SC public schools provide opportunities for students to learn and practice positive health behaviors so they can be fit, healthy and ready to learn. SC Healthy Schools is a partnership between the SC Department of Education and SC DHEC to improve students' health and academic outcomes by increasing physical activity, improving nutrition and preventing tobacco use and HIV among elementary, middle and high school students. Working with eMedia and ETV, SC Healthy Schools has documented the efforts of South Carolina school districts, schools and their community partners to implement best practices, programs and policies that support student health. This program looks at the CDC coordinated school health model and how coordination among the eight components – Health Education, Physical Education, Health Services, Nutrition Services, Counseling, Psychological and Social Services, Health Promoting Environment, Health Promotion for Staff, and Family/Community Involvement – can help students establish healthful behaviors and attitudes. It also looks at **Easterling Primary School in Marion School District Seven** where administrators and staff talk about programs and activities they have implemented to create a health-promoting environment. Viewers will learn about the CATCH program, a staff-wellness program and how these activities have benefited students and educators at this school.

Produced by eMedia and ETV, these stories have been adapted with permission and input from author Idella Bodie. They are dramatizations of the stories from her book *South Carolina Women*. Recommended to support social studies standards for South Carolina history for elementary and middle grade students, the programs are also good for use during Women's History Month with students in grades 3–12. Each dramatization tells the story of women who have shaped SC history and politics. The stories have been produced at historical sites and homes.

(NEW) Program Eleven (two parts) – Dacey Langston

A beloved American Revolutionary tale based on best-selling author Idella Bodie's book, the story of Dacey Langston is a tale of courage, sacrifice and determination. The year is 1781. British officer bloody Bill Cunningham and his band of scouts are plotting to attack in South Carolina's back country, the elder settlement and the continental army stationed nearby. Their plan is simple, leave no survivors. Dacey Langston was 14 years old when she became a spy for the American Patriots. Knowing that spies hanged for treason, Dacey risked her life to pass information along to her beloved brother James, an officer in the continental army, about Cunningham's plot to kill the residents and the soldiers. Dacey not only put herself into harm's way but also endangered her father, who realizes that his daughter has betrayed him by becoming a spy. But that isn't the only challenge that Dacey will face in this story. For this is also a story of a young girl falling in love for the first time. Through this story, students can journey back to a period where South Carolinians fought their own brothers and find out how this young woman was one of South Carolina's most courageous heroines. So renowned are the deeds of Dacey Langston that both a charter school and a DAR chapter are named after her. (This program is divided into two parts so be sure to access each part!)

Other Programs in Idella Bodie's SC Women Series

Program One – Grace and Rachel Martin

This is the story of two sisters-in-law living alone in the South Carolina back country who waylaid a British Courier with valuable papers by dressing up as colonial men. They risked their lives to stop the flow of information. Taped on location with historical costumes and artifacts, it takes place in the cabin considered to be the oldest frontier house still standing in SC.

Program Two – Emily Geiger

Emily is a young girl who risked her life by serving as a messenger for the Colonial army during the Revolutionary War. Captured by the British and interrogated as a spy, she managed to trick Lord Rawdon into believing she was innocent, outwitting her captors in a most unique manner. Taped in part at the actual location where the interrogation took place, this drama covers the story of Emily's journey from her assignment with General Greene to her release by Lord Rawdon.

Program Three – Mary Chesnut

Mary kept a diary during the turbulent times of the Civil War. This drama portrays various events in the life of the South Carolina heroine prior to and during the Civil War. The events dramatized are actual happenings that occurred to Mary and most of the words come straight from her diary. Mary actually spent time at Kensington Plantation, the location of the drama.

Program Four – The Grimké Sisters

Sarah Moore Grimké (1792–1873) and Angelina Emily Grimké (1805–1879), followed a similar path, speaking out about what they believed and leaving their home to join the fight for the causes of the abolition of slavery and equal rights for women. Today women are leaders in the community and in the business world, working along side their male counterparts in voicing and making their decisions, but it was not the same in the 1800's. These two sisters helped lead the way to change the course of history. From a young age they both stood up for what they believed were the wrongs of society. They spoke out against slavery, finding the courage to fight for their right to have a voice.

Program Five – Wil Lou Gray

Tells the story of Dr. Wil Lou Gray who began the South Carolina Opportunity School. The program follows her from the time that she was a young girl struggling with the loss of her dear mother through Dr. Gray's valiant efforts to get the Legislature to fund schooling for illiterate adults and children. Through reenactment of scenes in her life and interviews taped with Dr. Gray by ETV in the 1980's, we hear in Dr. Gray's own words her passion to help others to learn while we learn about what life was like during the early 1900's for many South Carolinians.

Program Six – Mary McLeod Bethune

This is the story of one woman's struggle to gain equality for herself and her students. The drama begins with Mary as a young child growing up in rural South Carolina and concludes with her hard work to start a school for African American students in Florida. The struggle that Mary encountered just to be given the chance to learn to read and then to teach others, including being threatened with bodily harm is shown. The drama shows how she started with nothing and ended up being an advisor to a President!

Program Seven – Modjeska Simkins

This is the story of an African American girl born to a half-white, half-black brick mason. She came from relative wealth and married into wealth, but dedicated her life to helping the disadvantaged to be treated equally. She was one of the organizers of the Supreme Court Case Briggs Vs. Elliott, which was the first filed of the four cases that later became combined Brown vs. Board of Education.

Program Eight – Mary Gordon Ellis

Mary Gordon Ellis was the first female to be elected to the South Carolina Legislature. This drama depicts her life from the challenges of being the school superintendent of Jasper County Schools where she addressed equality, making bold changes to impact education, to her time in office as an elected official until her untimely death at an early age.

Program Nine – Dorcas Richardson

The movie *The Patriot* was based loosely on Francis Marion fighting Colonel Banastre Tarleton in South Carolina during the American Revolutionary War. The Dorcas Richardson program tells the true story about one of Francis Marion's men, Richard Richardson, his wife Dorcas and their "battle" with Colonel Tarleton. Captain Richardson served under Francis Marion, better known as the Swamp Fox. After six years of fighting, Richard was left scarred from small pox and when he returned home, he discovered that Marion's enemy Tarleton was there, holding his wife prisoner. This story depicts the courage and steadfast love of Dorcas for her family and her newly-formed nation. Taped at Historic Camden, the story takes us back in time to where South Carolinians fought each other and the British. (Preview before use.)

Program Ten – Dr. Anne Austin Young

Dr. Anne Austin Young fought the norm that women could not be at the top of their college class nor become a medical doctor. Anne was one of the first female doctors in our state to practice medicine. This story covers her humble beginnings to later in life being inducted into the SC Hall of Fame. Despite prejudice, Anne proved women could succeed. Taped on location throughout the state, the drama inspires young people to achieve, despite any odds or prejudice. This story shows the many trials Anne encountered and worked to overcome in order to follow her dream.

Teacher Shares Plan Using Idella Bodie's SC Women

Amy O'Dell is currently enrolled in the eMedia Recertification courses *SC Chronicles Series II, III and IV* developed by eMedia using video-based programming that has been produced about our state. Bonnie McMurray, eMedia lead for recertification courses, asked Amy if we could share the lesson plan she developed that uses programs 1, 2 and 9 in the **Idella Bodie's SC Women** series. First, Amy shares a note about herself!

"I would like to take a brief moment to introduce myself. My name is Amy O'Dell and I am a South Carolina native. I currently live in San Diego, CA with my husband and children. I have taught in the public schools of SC for 15 years and am looking forward to our return to the SC area this spring. I have enjoyed being a Californian, but truly miss the excitement and opportunity the classroom affords. I miss those "aha moments" of discovery with the students. I love to teach history as a story and how it affected people personally."

Idella Bodie's SC Women Lesson Plan - Revolutionary War Unit of Study

I will use the Idella Bodie stories in a unit I have used in the past. The unit is a multifaceted unit that culminates with a "Living Museum." The unit profiles the contributions of the colonists of South Carolina alongside the national figures that are better known by the students when they enter the class.

The Idella Bodie videos not only bring the heroines to life, but they illustrate the strength of character and determination possessed by these women that helped the colony and nation overthrow the tyranny of the British Empire. Too often our history focuses only on the contributions of the white males during this time period, but in reality, we had a kaleidoscope of characters from various races/cultures and gender. As the biographies of these women illustrates so clearly, the Revolution needed the support and sacrifice of ALL the colonists. The profiles of the four women the videos shows that contributions were made in a variety of ways; dressing as men to overtake a courier, riding 50 miles to deliver a message to aid in the winning of a pivotal battle, and the fortitude needed to protect those you love by standing up to the likes of Tarleton.

Part I: Unit Study - The students (as a class) study, compare and contrast the contributions of South Carolina heroes and heroines to those of national figures. The goal is for the student to realize the integral role played by South Carolina in the American Revolution and that role was due to the steadfastness of the South Carolinians of that period. I would utilize the Idella Bodie profiles of the female heroines to have the characters brought to life. The unit includes males (multi-ethnic) and females (multi-ethnic).

Part II: Research Project - The students choose a figure from those we have studied and complete a research project. The student will journal daily about their thoughts on what they uncover. These journals will be both a personal reflection and one of discovery of the characteristics of their chosen historical figure. The journal entries will be guided by a set of questions.

Part III: Visual Presentation - The students will create a PowerPoint presentation highlighting their findings. They are to include illustrations/paintings of their chosen hero/heroine, description of their birth, death and life, and explain the contribution made by them and its importance to the American Revolution.

Part IV: Essay - Write a brief essay detailing the student's findings.

Part V: Living Museum - The student will dress to resemble their character and take part in a living museum. They will pretend to be wax figures in a South Carolina History Museum that come to life once a button on their pedestal is pressed. The day of the presentation, the classroom is transformed into an interactive museum. Five "pedestals" are set up for the students to pose, in character, until someone presses their button. Once the button is pressed the student then begins to speak, in character, and detail their importance to the revolution. Once their vignette is finished, they return to their original pose.

Standard Addressed:

Social Studies

- The student will demonstrate an understanding of the American Revolution and South Carolina's role in the development of the new American nation.

ELA

- The student will read and comprehend a variety of literary texts in print and non-print formats.
- The student will create written work that has a clear focus, sufficient detail, coherent organization, effective use of voice, and correct use of the conventions of written Standard American English.
- The student will write for a variety of purposes and audiences.
- The student will access and use information from a variety of sources.

The unique and independent American woman: adventurer ... pioneer ... poet ... mother ... educator ... artist ... freedom fighter. *A History of Women's Achievement in America* examines the 400-year history of American women's inspiring accomplishments and victories. Without the American woman's pioneering fortitude, the early colonies at Jamestown and Plymouth Plantation, would not have survived. From then on, millions of American pioneer women would push the frontier ever forward. The World of Julia Peterkin: Cheating the Stillness

Presented nationwide last April by ETV and now part of the eMedia series **ETV Presents**, this program chronicles the life of Julia Peterkin, South Carolina author and 1929 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction for *Scarlet Sister Mary* that was set in a South Carolina African-American farming community. Her tales of struggling black families captivated America. Trying to choose between life as a New York writer and as a plantation mistress in SC, Peterkin rebelled against what was expected of a Southern Lady.

Colonial Williamsburg Electronic Field Trips 2011–12

March 15 at 1:00 p.m. on ETV – *Remember the Ladies*

The CWEFT programs use 21st century technology to enrich the teaching of history and social studies, making the subjects exciting and relevant to today's classrooms. The field trips are correlated to national standards and provide a dramatic and compelling learning experience for 4th and 5th grade students. Though schools may view the programs free and record them with 10-day fair use rights (can tape and use for 10 days from broadcast date, but must erase tape within 45 days), there are definite advantages to paying the fee to Colonial Williamsburg to participate.

By paying the fee to participate, schools get the outstanding teacher materials, get to keep the recorded program for the life of the tape and have access to the re-enactors and historians online and via a toll-free number. Schools pay approximately \$500 per school for all seven programs, but rights for individual programs can be purchased. Mar. 15, 2012 ***Remember the Ladies*** – In 1776, Abigail Adams requested that her husband, future president John Adams, “remember the ladies” when establishing the government and the laws of the new nation. Examine the roles, responsibilities and daily activities of early American women.

Apr. 19, 2012 ***The Rights of Youth*** – Imprisonment, whipping, forced transportation, and even death were some of the punishments that courts sentenced children to in the 18th century. Witness how justice was administered at a time when criminal laws and sentencing guidelines made few or no exceptions for children.

***RIGHTS: SC schools may view with 10-day fair use rights. (Can record, but program must be used within ten days and erased/destroyed within 45 days.) ETV's Carolina Stories – Programs Feature Special Women

- **Modjeska Monteith Simkins – Makin' A Way Out of No Way**

Repeats March 1, 9:25–10:23 a.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) Also online in *StreamlineSC*

Modjeska Monteith Simkins (1899–1992) was one South Carolina's great women. Entitled **Modjeska Monteith Simkins – Makin' A Way Out of No Way**, this program paints an interesting profile of the civil rights matriarch and human rights activist and was produced by ETV's Beryl Dakers. Born in Columbia, Modjeska graduated from Benedict College in 1921 and taught school before she was married in 1929. She had to quit her job because at that time SC schools could not employ married women, but she continued to work at different jobs to make a difference by representing the needs of the African-American community. In the 1940s and 1950s, she helped create over a hundred branches of the NAACP around our state. She believed that the best way to make change was to vote so she made sure people knew about their voting rights and participated in elections. For the rest of her life, she dedicated herself to the idea of civil rights and opportunity for all people.

- **This is Brookgreen Gardens**

This ETV program that aired for the first time in February 2008 explores one of the state's most beloved landmarks! A distinctive collection of American figurative sculpture, education programs, dazzling gardens, rare natural habitats, and a long, fascinating history make Brookgreen Gardens a unique treasure. The program highlights artist and philanthropist Anna Hyatt Huntington's life and works, outlining the path that she and her equally famous husband took to create Brookgreen Gardens and populate the coastal plantation with art, not only created by Mrs. Huntington, but by artists from throughout the world. Their home, the gardens and the sculpture are the focus of the program as we learn about the Huntington's dream of sharing the art in this historic, natural setting and helping to develop the Murrell's Inlet area of the low country by providing services and jobs for the residents.

POETRY OUT LOUD

National Recitation Contest for High Schools in South Carolina

Mark your calendars now! For an eighth year, the South Carolina Arts Commission will partner with the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation to bring **Poetry Out Loud: National Recitation Contest** to high schools across South Carolina. POL encourages the nation's youth to learn about great poetry through memorization and performance, which helps students master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and internalize our rich literary heritage. Since 2006, over 225 high schools, 645 teachers, and 27,500 students have participated in Poetry Out Loud in our state.

POL starts in the classroom, with participating educators using the free POL Teacher toolkit filled with curriculum materials to teach poetry recitation and run classroom competitions. Following a pyramid structure, classroom winners advance to a school-wide competition, then to a regional competition, then to a state competition, and ultimately to the National Finals. To accommodate teacher's already busy schedules, the program usually takes place during the fall or early winter over the span of two to three weeks, according to each teacher's interest and agenda, and it will not require full class periods during that time. Teachers may also work POL into existing poetry units.

Following school competitions, regional competitions will be held in Spartanburg and Sumter on January 12th and in Charleston on January 13th. Nine regional finalists will move on to compete in the state finals held in Columbia, SC on March 2, 2013. Following the state finals, the National Finals will be held in Washington, DC, in late April or early May. The state winner receives \$200 and an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington to compete for the national championship and \$500 for their school library. The first runner-up receives \$100, plus \$200 for his or her school library. A total of \$50,000 in awards and school stipends is awarded annually at the National Finals.

Recommended for use in school news programs on all levels, these short segments were developed by eMedia and ETV working with SC Healthy Schools, DHEC, the USC School of Medicine, and the ESMMSD Coalition to promote the Eat Smart Move More SC messages in an effort to address childhood obesity.

- **Taking Charge in Meadowland**

Repeat Block Feed March 1, 12:25–1:32 p.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) SL

Designed for grades K–3, this resource encourages the young student to “take charge of their health.” Focusing on a healthy lifestyle, the first program challenges students to eat nutritional foods combined with daily exercise. The first lesson is the same as the second, but the second has “activity” stop points corresponding to the online tool kit.

- **Tick Tock Minutes**

Repeat Block Feed March 1, 1:37–2:27 p.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) SL

Designed for grades Pre-K–3, this series of one-minute programs is entertaining and features important messages in a fun format. Dr. Tick Tock talks about the benefits of good health in the first 15 lessons.

- **Eat Well, Be Well**

Repeat Block Feed March 1, 2:40–5:15 p.m. IMC (Unlimited rights)

Designed for grades 1–4, these eight lessons, each 15-minutes in duration, provide nutritional information to reinforce healthy behavior patterns in young students.

- **Lucy’s Tasty Treasures and Tasty Bites**

Repeat Block Feed March 1, 5:20–7:49 p.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) SL

Designed for grades 3–5, these two-minute “Bites” seek to improve nutrition and physical activity knowledge and behaviors of elementary-age students.

- **Daily Food Choices for Healthy Living**

Repeats March 2, 8:00–8:22 a.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) SL

Designed for grades 5–12, this 21-minute program has been developed using USDA research on what foods we eat and the nutrients in those foods. Students learn how to make good food choices.

- **Connect with Kids At-Risk, Lesson 1 *Fat Chance: Teen Obesity***

Designed for grades 6–12, this lesson in this series features true stories and real kids in a peer-to-peer format to help them understand and improve their attitudes.

- **Exploring Healthy Choices, Lesson 1 *New Dietary Guidelines*, Lesson 2 *Portion Control* and Lesson 3 *Overweight in America***

Designed for grades 6–12, the lessons in this series teach students vital information concerning key areas of health. These three lessons focus on diet, portion control and being overweight.

Auntie Karen’s Place – Features Sickle Cell Segment

Repeats March 2, 8:27–8:59 a.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) Also online in *StreamlineSC*

Added to the schedule in 2009, this program for grades Pre K–5th focuses on life skills using music and puppets. Topics include: **Jazz Music; Sickle Cell Awareness; Financial Literacy; and Emergency Preparedness**. The Auntie Karen Foundation partnered with ETV, Palmetto Health Children’s Hospital and the USC School of Music to create this resource. Students are introduced to Auntie Karen characters: Olivia the Octopus, Bull and Bear and The Jamaican Yams. For more information, go to Auntie Karen Foundation www.auntiekaren.org.

Healthy Hannah's Healthy Choice Heroes

Ten NEW Programs, NEW Program Order for All Twenty & Descriptions

Healthy Hannah's Healthy Choice Heroes is an exciting educational series of very short programs designed to assist students in making healthy living choices. Ten programs were produced for March 2011 and ten more now join the lineup. The new set of ten programs is integrated into the first group and this is the order recommended for use by K–6 grade students.

Healthy Hannah is a superhero-like character that communicates with and guides two students through a variety of real-life everyday scenarios and missions that facilitate them learning how to make healthy choices and the concepts behind those choices. This fun and fast-paced series is designed to educate children in grades K–6 about nutrition and physical activity based on the Dietary Guidelines and MyPyramid.

The short programs, between 2 and 3 minutes each, are designed to be used in the morning news program and incorporated into lesson plans or to be used with lesson plans that have been developed for each short program (will be posted online with programs). The programs, combined with their respective lesson plans, meet the South Carolina Academic Standards for Health and Safety Education for grades K–6. Produced by ETV, working with the SC Department of Education and DHEC, this series is also posted in *StreamlineSC*.

School Health Success Stories – eMedia PD Series

This series documents the efforts of SC districts, schools and their community partners to implement best practices, programs and policies that support student health and was developed by SCDE's SC Healthy Schools through a cooperative agreement with and funding from the CDCs, Division of Adolescent and School Health. SC Healthy Schools is a partnership between the SC Department of Education and SC DHEC to improve students' health and academic outcomes by increasing physical activity, improving nutrition and preventing tobacco use and HIV among elementary, middle and high school students. Resource is designed for administrators, teachers, school nurses, counselors, school health/wellness committee members, parents, community partners, and others interested in student health and academic achievement.

Working Together for Health and Learning: A Coordinated Approach to School Health (15:31)

To reach our academic goals, schools, families and communities must address the needs of the whole child. Using a coordinated school health approach, schools provide opportunities for students to learn and practice positive health behaviors so they can be fit, healthy and ready to learn! This program discusses the CDC coordinated school health model and how collaboration among the eight components - Health Ed; Physical Ed; Health Services; Nutrition Services; Counseling, Psychological and Social Services; Health Promoting Environment; Health Promotion for Staff; and Family/Community Involvement - can help students establish healthful behaviors and attitudes.

Nevitt Forest Elementary, Anderson School District Five (14:23)

Nevitt Forest partners with Palmetto Ag Consultants, the Anderson County Farmers Market, Clemson, and local farmers. Highlights the "Grow with Me" program-use of school gardens and integration of fresh fruits and veggies and nutrition education throughout the academic curriculum.

Kelly Miller Elementary, School District of Fairfield County (12:56)

Highlights CATCH (Coordinated Approach To Child Health), a proven effective program that teaches students the importance of nutrition and physical activity. Working to address obesity, school staff and community discuss school activities such as Favorite Fruit Friday.

Manning Primary School, Clarendon School District Two (14:39)

Learn more about the planning, building and use of a 12-station fitness trail. Built by Manning High School students, the fitness trail is used by Manning Primary School teachers to incorporate physical activity into academic lessons and provides physical activity for the community.

Richland School District 2 (12:21)

Superintendent Stephen Hefner and district staff discuss the development and success of Commit to 2B Fit, a district-wide school employee wellness program. Nearly 800 district employees participated in the program and made the commitment to be healthy and fit.

R.B. Stall High School, Charleston County School District (15:46)

In an effort to reduce sexual risk behaviors among students, R.B. Stall and the Charleston Trident Urban League partnered to implement Safer Choices, a research-based, proven effective sexuality education curriculum. School staff and community partners discuss the benefits.

Drayton Hall Elementary School, Charleston County School District (17:17)

In an effort to improve student health, Drayton Hall Elementary adopted a variety of school health programs and practices. Featured activities include the Healthy Bobcat Club, Walk to School Day, incorporation of physical activity into the classroom, and daily walks after lunch.

Wren Elementary School, Anderson School District One (7:44)

This segment focuses on how teachers at Wren Elementary are integrating physical education and SC history with "Pedaling Across the Palmetto State" activities. Students track their biking miles across the state and then receive a history lesson about where they "ride."

Bamberg School District Two (10:04)

Bamberg School District Two is proud of the success and national recognition they have received with Teen Life Center and implementation of comprehensive sexuality education at Denmark-Olar High School and Denmark-Olar Middle School.

Jennie Moore Elementary School, Charleston County School District (19:20)

Jennie Moore Elementary has developed a strong partnership with parents and community businesses to improve nutrition and increase physical activity among students. Highlights "Taste It Tuesday" and "Fitness Club" activities that happen with help from parents and local grocery.

Charleston Progressive Academy, Charleston County School District (7:16)

To increase physical activity among students, CPA began opening the gym for a morning physical activity period. As a result, the school has seen a dramatic reduction in discipline referrals and suspensions, as well as improved student concentration and focus in the classroom.

Burke Middle/High School, Charleston County School District (8:45)

Community partnerships have proven to be valuable to Burke Middle/High School in their efforts to improve student health and academics. Learn about health-promoting activities made possible by partnerships with the Culinary Arts Program, The Lean Team, MUSC, and others.

R.B. Stall High School (Special Ed), Charleston County School District (14:37)

R.B. Stall High School recognizes the importance of physical activity for all students. After adding a daily physical activity period for special education students, teachers and staff have seen improvement in student engagement, interaction and cognitive skills.

Simpsonville Elementary School, Greenville County School District (8:49)

Greenville County Schools are implementing the Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) program in many of its elementary schools. Teachers and food service staff at this school have coordinated efforts to improve nutrition and increase physical activity among students.

Easterling Primary School, Marion School District Seven (10:35)

Coach Pete Ellis, administrators and staff at Easterling Primary discuss programs and activities they have implemented to create a health-promoting environment. Learn about the CATCH program, a staff wellness program and how these activities have benefited students and staff.

Richland County School District One (8:42)

Richland School District One in Columbia, SC adopted a 100% tobacco free policy on all school property. Their policy also requires using proven effective tobacco prevention curricula - in this case, Botvin *LifeSkills Training*.



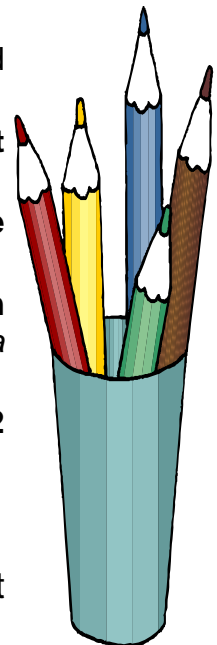
