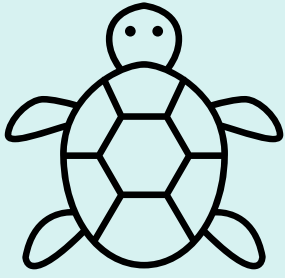

The ocean is largely unexplored.

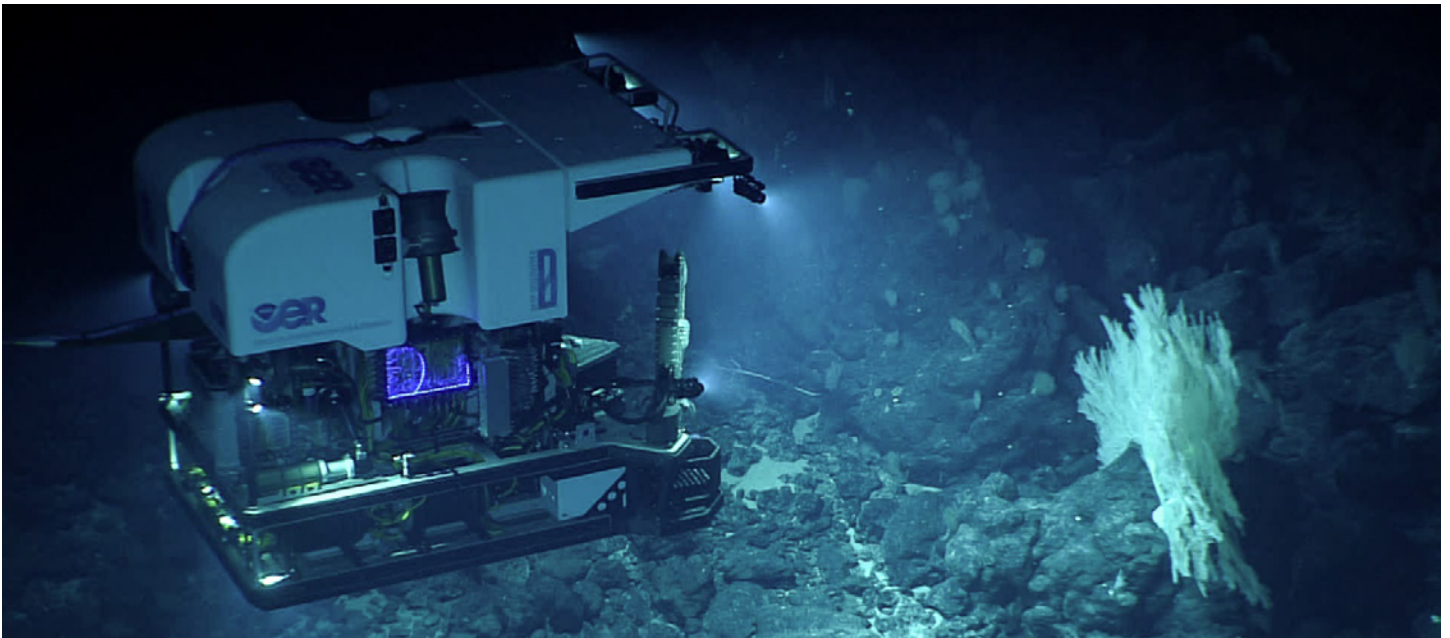
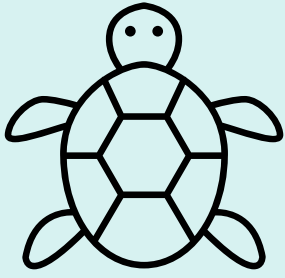
