The SC Human Affairs Commission is a state agency dedicated to providing and promoting diversity, equal and fair rights for all citizens in regards to race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin, or disability across the state of South Carolina in employment, housing, and public accommodation. The legendary, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was a phenomenal leader during the civil rights movement who will be remembered for a lifetime. Dr. King's powerful speeches touched lives of millions during such a time where segregation and inequality were part of the daily life. Dr. King's birthday was January 15, 1929. "Representative John Conyers introduced the first motion to make Dr. King's birthday a federal holiday in 1968, just four days after his assassination in Memphis. Officially, Dr. King's birthday was approved as a federal holiday in 1983" (National Constitution Center, 2015).



The holiday is normally recognized every third Monday of January annually. This year, the observance of Dr. King's birthday coincidentally fell on the actual day. Many community groups and organizations, including a few of SCHAC's Community Relations Councils host events in honor of Dr. King. SCHAC would like to share a few events which some of our active CRCs hosted.

**\*City of Rock Hill CRC** hosted the 15th annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Interfaith Prayer Breakfast on Monday, January 15, 2018 from 7:30am-9:00am at First Baptist Church. The council invited guest speaker, Dr. Derrick Aldridge, a native of Rock Hill and professor in the Curry School at the University of Virginia.

**\*McCormick County CRC** participated in the Martin Luther King, Jr., two mile march from the Little Mill Baptist Church to the Mims Center in Willington.

**\*The Greater Columbia Community Relations Council** held its monthly "Hot Topics" session at its January luncheon club meeting. The topic was entitled "The Effectiveness of Boycotts". The Greater Columbia CRC welcomes interested individuals who would like to discuss community related issues.
