FMU hosts first Pee Dee Fiction Festival, Nov. 9-11

Francis Marion University will hold the first Pee Dee Fiction Festival, Nov. 9-11.

The three-day festival will celebrate the book. All scheduled events will be held in the Cauthen Educational Media Center's Lowrimore Auditorium on the FMU campus. Admission is free and open to the public, and registration is required by Nov. 7. To register, call the FMU Department of English, Modern Languages and Philosophy at 843-661-1371.

The event will feature authors Andre Dubus III, Ellen Gilchrist, and Dinah Johnson, as well as panel discussions, readings, and book signings. Many fiction topics will be covered, including screenwriting, Christian fiction, "front porch stories," and regionalism. Two screenings of the film "House of Sand and Fog," based on Dubus' book of the same name, will also be shown.

The festival is being organized by FMU English professors Ed Eleazer and Lynn Kostoff. Several other FMU English faculty will participate in the events as well.

Dubus is the author of a collection of short fiction, "The Cage Keeper and Other Stories," and the novels "Bluesman," and "House of Sand and Fog." The basis of a major motion picture (starring Ben Kingsley and Jennifer Connelly) and published in 25 countries, "House of Sand and Fog" was an Oprah Book Club Selection and No. 1 New York Times bestseller.



Gilchrist's first book was a book of poetry, "The Land Surveyor's Daughter" (1979). She followed it up with "Riding Out the Tropical Depression: Selected Poems, 1975-1985" (1986). She attracted critical and popular accolades from the publication of her book of short fiction, "In the Land of Dreamy Dreams," in 1981.

Johnson, a native of Charleston, graduated from Spring Valley High School in Columbia. She also graduated from Princeton University, and earned a Ph.D. from Yale University. She teaches at the University of South Carolina. Johnson's primary research interest is African-American children's literature.

Francis Marion University begins 37th year

Francis Marion University officially began its 37th year with the start of fall classes in August.

FMU students have a new venue where they can socialize with classmates, grab a snack, and just relax. The Grille, a 4,770-square foot activity center, also will be available for use by student groups for special events. Located next to the outdoor pool, the Grille provides an additional dining option for students throughout the day and evening. The menu includes grill items such as hamburgers, chicken sandwiches, wings and fries; deli items such as subs, wraps and salads; pizza and pasta; and breakfast items.

The dining area seats approximately 90 people, and tables and chairs on the outdoor porch and patio will provide additional seating. With the opening of the Grille, the University Center Café has been closed permanently.

The new Frank B. Lee Nursing Building opened this fall. The 30,000-square-foot facility is located on the north side of the campus pond. Until recently a satellite program of the

Medical University of South Carolina, the stand-alone FMU nursing program has been in the process of expanding to provide more baccalaureate-degree prepared nurses. The program will increase the number of nursing majors this year by 50 percent, from 32 to 48. The facility will provide space for this expansion including classrooms, an auditorium, a clinical care lab area, and a computer lab.

In June, FMU dedicated Hanson Park, located between the Cottage and Wallace House, in memory of longtime faculty member and administrator Gary Hanson who died last year. The 1.5-acre park has a garden-like atmosphere with footpaths, water pools and picnic tables where students and employees can find a quiet place for an outdoor lunch or to read and reflect. The park was designed in-house and all work was completed by FMU physical plant staff.

Several other major projects are in the works. Planned for the 2006-2007 year is construction of phase two of Forest

FMU receives \$7 million for Performing Arts Center

The final piece of the puzzle for construction of a downtown Florence performing arts center fell into place in June with the announcement by Sen. Hugh Leatherman of a \$7 million state appropriation to Francis Marion University.

In a news conference held at the future site of the facility, Sen. Leatherman said he was delighted that the S.C. General Assembly, in the recently passed state budget, provided the necessary funds to help with construction of the estimated \$17 million facility.

"The performing arts center will serve the entire Pee Dee area, thereby expanding the cultural opportunities for all our residents," said Sen. Leatherman, who earlier had obtained \$1 million in downtown redevelopment funds for the project.

FMU will partner with the City of Florence to build the facility to be named the Francis Marion University Center for the Performing Arts. This building will be located on 3.93 acres of land at the corner of Dargan and West Palmetto streets.

Also announced was the seven-member governing board, four appointed by the university and three by the city, which will set policy for operating the facility.

The university's representatives on the board are FMU President Fred Carter, who will serve as chairman; Marva Smalls, executive vice president of public affairs and chief of staff of Nickelodeon, Nick at Nite, TV Land, Noggin and Spike TV; Ben Zeigler, a Florence attorney; and Larry Anderson,

chairman of FMU's Fine Arts Department.

The city's members of the board are Billy D. Williams, Florence City Councilman; Shirley R. Imbeau, longtime community arts activist; and Michael O. Blakeley, senior vice president and city executive with Sentry Bank and Trust.

Carter said he was thankful to Sen. Leatherman for securing the additional construction funds. "This is another example of how the senator's influence is benefiting the people of the Pee Dee region," he said. "This facility will play a pivotal role in boosting cultural enrichment and educational excellence throughout the region."

Both the land, currently owned by the city, and the performing arts center building will be deeded to FMU, which will act as fiduciary agent for construction and operation of the center and will employ the center's director. FMU and the City of Florence will share operational and maintenance costs.

The performing arts center will have space for theatrical and musical performances, and office and instructional classroom space. The completion date is projected for late summer 2008.

In January, FMU received a \$10 million grant from Drs. Bruce & Lee Foundation toward building a performing arts center in downtown Florence. That was part of a multi-partnership agreement that included land exchanges involving the City of Florence, Florence County, McLeod Health, Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation and Francis Marion University.

Villas apartments, which will add another 200 beds to campus housing.

Also planned for this year is construction of the Center for the Child, a \$3 million project to be located next to the Pee Dee Education Center, property that was recently deeded back to the university. The center will be an important teaching facility for the early childhood education and psychology programs

and will enable students to get firsthand experience in dealing with small children. In addition, it will serve as a daycare facility for children of employees and students.

Also on the drawing board is a \$16 million building to house the School of Business and School of Education. This approximately 61,000-square-foot building will be built on the south side of the campus pond. Funding is expected to come from a state bond package.

Wireless network installed at FMU for fall semester

The Francis Marion University campus is going wireless. When students returned to the campus in late August to begin the fall semester, the first phase of a centrally managed, wireless computer network was operational.

The wireless network allows students to access the Internet from 10 locations scattered across the campus. Each location has been identified as a public gathering site where students congregate.

Students using computers with wireless cards can access the network and Internet in these locations. Students may use the Internet as a 'guest-user,' or can log-in to the campus network for higher levels of access and services.

The system will be managed by FMU's Academic Computing Services. The wireless network consists of Cisco wireless access points, the Cisco Clean Access system and other networking equipment to provide users mobile access to the Internet.



In order to connect to the wireless network, students must have an operational wireless network card, an updated operating system, agree to university policies while connected and have updated antivirus software installed to protect their computer and the network from Internet viruses.

Signs are being installed so students can identify the wireless access points around campus. Locations will include Rogers Library, the Lee Nursing Building, Smith University Center, the breezeway and lounges of Founders Hall and Cauthen Media Center, Ervin Dining Hall, the residential area and Forest Villas apartments, Stanton Academic Computer Center, and the Grille and outdoor swimming pool area.

Academic Computing Services will provide wireless technical support for students using the wireless network.

FMU Trustees approve \$41.7 million budget, tuition increase

The Francis Marion University Board of Trustees adopted a \$41.7 million operating budget for the university's 2006-2007 fiscal year during its quarterly meeting June 2.

The trustees also increased tuition 8 percent per semester. The increase means that full-time South Carolina resident undergraduates will pay \$3,256 per semester, up \$239 from last year. Tuition for the FMU nursing program was set at \$5,049 per semester, an increase of \$372 from last year.

Full-time out-of-state undergraduate students will now pay \$6,419.50 per semester, and out-of-state nursing students will pay \$10,005.50 per semester. Full-time South Carolina graduate students will pay \$3,356 per semester, while out-of-state graduate students will pay \$6,619.50 per semester.

Also approved by the board, and included in the above totals, is a \$25 hike in the student activity fee to support growth in student related programs.

In other business, the trustees adopted a university-wide strategic plan and reinstated the Francis Marion College medallion to be used for ceremonial occasions. The board also thanked Joe Heyward, vice president for student affairs, who retired in June, for his 30-plus years of service to FMU.

FMU's \$41.7 million projected budget includes \$16.3 million in state appropriations, \$23.7 million in student fees and \$1.7 million in other revenue. The biggest part of the budget goes for personnel costs set at \$32.1 million, \$9 million for operating expenses, and about a half million dollars earmarked for specific new programs.

During their August retreat at Santee Cooper's Wampee Conference Center in Pinopolis, the trustees heard reports on campus facilities and future development, academic affairs, the Swamp Fox Writing Project, the Pee Dee Fiction Festival, the Center for the Child, the Center of Excellence, student affairs, athletics, the FMU Foundation, community relations and alumni affairs.

During their quarterly board meeting, the trustees approved resolutions authorizing FMU to offer a bachelor of science degree in middle level education (grades 5-8), authorizing construction of new apartments for 200 students in the Forest Villas complex, and accepting conveyance of six parcels of land from the City of Florence and McLeod Health to develop the FMU Center for the Performing Arts in downtown Florence.

FMU hosts ceramic surfaces symposium

Francis Marion University hosted the Southern Fried Ceramic Surfaces Symposium, July 27-29.

The event was a regional conference of the Potters Council, a nonprofit subsidiary of the American Ceramic Society. The conference featured presentations of ceramic surface techniques from local and national artists. Local presenters included Patz Fowle of Hartsville and Sasha and Tari Federer of Florence. FMU ceramics professor Doug Gray, who currently serves as vice president of the Potters Council Board of

Directors, organized the conference and was also a presenter. Gray said that approximately 70 artists attended the event.

"Francis Marion University was very fortunate to host this symposium which featured a handful of the talented ceramic artists from South Carolina and across the states," said Gray.

Other presenters included Jim Connell of Winthrop University, Dave Finkelnburg, Rikki Gill, David Hendley, Mel Jacobson, Dannon Rhudy, Virginia Scotchie of the University of South Carolina, Stephani Stephenson, and Kurt Wild.

FMU makes key appointments

Francis Marion University has recently made several key faculty, staff and athletic appointments.

Darryl Bridges has been promoted to vice president of student affairs. Bridges, of Florence, replaces Joe Heyward, who retired after 33 years of service to FMU. Bridges' responsibilities will include providing leadership for the university's Division of Student Affairs. He will oversee all departments in the division, including the Dean of Students' Office, the Office of Counseling and Testing, Student Health Services, the Office of Career Development, the Office of Multicultural Affairs, and the Office of Student Affairs. She will also administer the student judicial system, serve as an adviser to the Student Government Association, supervise the cheerleading advisers, be involved in new student orientation, and respond to general issues concerning students.

FMU obtains military commission document of Francis Marion

Francis Marion University has obtained the congressional military commission of Revolutionary War hero and university namesake Francis Marion.

The document commissions Francis Marion as lieutenant colonel in the Second South Carolina Regiment of the U.S. Army, effective Sept. 16, 1776.

The document was purchased with private funds from Charleston attorney C. Allen Gibson Jr., a descendant of Francis Marion's sister, Rebecca Marion. The commission, which has been appraised at \$11,500, was passed down through the family for generations.

The commission was purchased below market value, with the remaining value given as a gift by the family to the

university. The document measures 30.5 by 18.5 cm, and its condition is "very good," according to the appraisal.

"With so few artifacts relating to General Marion in existence, we are thrilled to have obtained this rare historical document," said FMU president Fred Carter.

Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation funds nursing scholarships

The Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation has donated \$200,000 to Francis Marion University to continue funding the nursing scholarships it established in 1998.

The money will be used to renew scholarships for eligible students and to attract new students to the nursing program. Students from Florence, Darlington, Dillon, Marion, Williamsburg, Clarendon and Marlboro counties are eligible for the scholarships. Students who maintain the required grade point average may renew the scholarship for subsequent years.

During the 2005-06 academic year, 49 FMU students received assistance from the scholarships.

FMU has assumed control of the bachelor of science in nursing program, which was previously a cooperative program between FMU and the Medical University of South Carolina. Construction on a new facility to house the program is complete thanks to a \$5.5 million gift from the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation.

The foundation also contributes funding to the Non-Profit Leadership Institute at FMU, which graduated its fourth class in April. The mission of the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation is "To advance the general welfare and quality of all life in the Florence, S.C., area by providing economic support to qualified programs and non-profit organizations."

"I cannot say enough about the generous support – both financial and otherwise – that Francis Marion University receives from the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation each and every day," said FMU president Fred Carter. "Through these nursing scholarships and a new state-of-the-art nursing building, the foundation is ensuring the availability of qualified local nurses, which in turn will benefit the healthcare of thousands of Pee Dee residents for years to come."

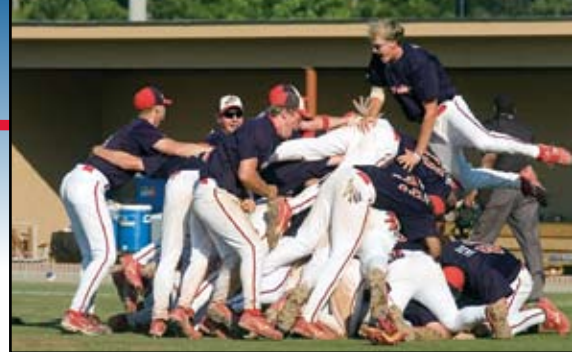
Patriots enjoy best season ever,

reach College World Series

The Francis Marion University baseball team enjoyed its most successful season ever in 2006 by setting a team record for victories with a 41-18 record and by making the program's first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division II College World Series. The Patriots also finished the year ranked sixth nationally.

The Patriots finished the regular season second in the Peach Belt Conference with a 37-15 overall mark, but FMU suffered a quick two-loss exit from the PBC Tournament. However, coach Art Inabinet's charges received a bid to the NCAA Tournament, the program's third in four seasons, and the Patriots responded with four wins at the South Atlantic Regional in Milledgeville, Ga., including a come-from-behind 7-4 victory over the host team Georgia College & State University in the regional title game to advance to Montgomery, Ala., for the College World Series.

Matched against the nation's top team in the opening game of the series, Francis Marion dropped a heartbreaking 4-3 decision to the University of Tampa. The Patriots then lost 3-2 in 10 innings to West Chester University, ending FMU's season.
