Instructional video-based resources, accessed via the **K–12 Instructional Media Channel (IMC)** through OnePlaceSC or online archived in **StreamlineSC**, are available to SC teachers FREE! Working with ETV's educational production team, eMedia continues to produce instructional programming needed by our schools and coordinate resources to support the K–12 curriculum. The content of the local productions for K–12 students and educator professional development is coordinated by eMedia, working with content professionals at the SC Department of Education.

Professional development programs produced by eMedia with SCDE content professionals provide schools with important information and training in a cost-effective manner. Series in areas of **Gifted and Talented Education**, **the Arts**, **ESOL**, **Special Education**, **World Languages**, **Career and Technology Education**, **Literacy**, **Montessori** and **Single Gender Education**, **PBIS**, **Special Education**, **School Counseling**, **Pathways to Graduation**, and **Health/Nutrition/Physical Activity** continue to be produced through this partnership and are provided on the IMC and online in *StreamlineSC*. This special **Project Discovery** program, produced by the South Carolina Department of Education's eMedia team with SCETV, aired for the first time November 27, 2012. **Life at Lemmon Hill Plantation, Part 1** takes students to a historic home near Winnsboro to learn why settlers living in our coastal areas made their way inland to build working plantations as we take a look at life during the 1790's and early 1800's in the piedmont region of our state. During this period of our history, western Fairfield county was a bastion of extreme wealth with cotton and indigo grown abundantly in the fertile fields and beautiful, blue granite mined in nearby quarries.

Project Discovery - Life at Lemmon Hill Plantation, Part 2 will premiere February 26 and focus on the contributions of the African Americans who helped South Carolina plantations prosper. As craftsmen they built fine and useful furnishings, some of which we'll get to see in this program. We extend special thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Corley, owners of Lemmon Hill Plantation, for working with eMedia and SCETV to produce this interesting program that allows South Carolina students to go back in time to see what life was like over 200 years ago in this area of our state. NEW SC Hall of Fame Short – Gen. William Westmoreland

These programs have been produced as part of ETV's SC Hall of Fame project. The third program is the story of General William C. Westmoreland, an Eagle Scout from Spartanburg County who earned medals for bravery in World War II and became a Four-Star General and Military Commander of Allied Forces in Vietnam from 1964-1968. Historians, family and friends remember the uncompromising values of the man behind the four stars. Dr. Andrew Birtle, Military Historian with the Center of Military History in Washington, D.C., General Mick Zais, SC Superintendent of Education, and James Ripley "Rip" Westmoreland, the General's son, all provide insight into the life of this famous South Carolinian as we see photographs from the General William C. Westmoreland Collection at the South Caroliniana Library at USC and special footage from the ETV archives.

*The block feed contains three programs: South Carolina Astronauts, SC Famous Sons who fought in the Alamo and then the program on Westmoreland.

Colonial Williamsburg Electronic Field Trips 2012–13

The CWEFT programs use 21st century technology to enrich the teaching of history and social studies. The field trips are correlated to national standards and provide a compelling learning experience for grades 4–8, using re-enactors to play the roles of historical figures. By paying the fee to participate, schools get the outstanding teacher materials, get to keep the recorded program for the life of the tape and have access to the re-enactors and historians online and via a toll-free number. Schools pay approximately \$500 per school for all seven programs, but rights for individual programs can be purchased. Jan. 17, 2013 ***Research Rescue Squad (premiere)*** – Someone is stealing books and removing footnotes. The Research Rescue Squad will save the day to defeat the evil "Dubious Sources," helping students do solid research using the library, Internet and museums.

Feb. 14, 2013 ***The Slave Trade*** – Explores the U.S. Law of 1807 that abolished the transatlantic slave trade. Meet the people involved in or influenced by this pivotal legislation: slaves, plantation owners, slave-ship captains and crew, government officials, navy officers, and antislavery activists.

Mar. 14, 2013 ***The Global Economy (premiere)*** – Join Maggie, an adventurous rat, as she boards ships using international trade routes to make her way home from England to the American colonies. Along the way, discover the inner workings of an 18th c. mercantile system.

Apr. 11, 2013 ***The Industrious Tradesmen*** – Follow the lives of several journeymen fresh from their apprenticeships in trades and business as they learn how skill and opportunity will impact their careers. Who will achieve their dreams and become masters of their own shops?

RIGHTS: SC schools may view with 10-day fair use rights. (Can record, but program must be used within ten days and erased/destroyed within 45 days.) ONLY schools that get a scholarship through eMedia OR pay CWEFT to participate can keep the copy of the program(s) for the life of the tape/DVD, receive the guides, get online access, and have phone interaction with the historians.

Tune Up to Literacy – Songs Reinforce Literacy Concepts

Repeat block feed Jan. 15, 1:35–1:55 p.m. IMC (Unlimited rights) Also online in *StreamlineSC*

This series is “the song way to learning language.” With original songs created by composer, lyricist and educator Dr. Al Balkin, former Western Michigan Professor and composer who wrote the music for America’s first production of *The Hobbit* as well as several off-Broadway children’s musicals, the short programs are recommended for students in grades pre-K through 3.

The fast-paced, short programs, each between one and three minutes, musically introduce and reinforce crucial literacy concepts such as using the period, punctuation and sentence construction. Programs 3-7 are NEW for this school year.

Special thanks to Dr. Balkin for providing his songs for South Carolina schools and allowing eMedia with ETV to develop video to go with his music to create these fun programs that encourage literacy!

- 1 **Get the Point** (duration 1:22)
Without the number one punctuation mark – the period – words would run together like scrambled eggs and make no sense. This calypso song celebrates the period’s existence. Children will learn its primary function and through constant pun on “point,” what it looks like!
- 2 **Punctuation Mystery** (duration 1:45)
This song acknowledges the difficulties of comprehensive punctuation, declares awareness of the problem and an inclination to solve it! Framed musically around a tango, a dance from Argentina, the song includes commas, colons, semi-colons, and apostrophes ... just to name a few!
- 3 **A Syllable** (duration 1:11)
Understanding the concept of syllable is the “open sesame” to sounding out almost any written word. Developing this ability allows a child to move into the world of reading. This song defines the concept to peak interest!
- 4 **What’s a Consonant, What’s a Vowel?** (duration 1:25)
A consonant can be almost any letter you see except an A, or an I, or an O or a U, or an E. Those are the vowels that consonants keep company. This message is presented in the musical setting of an Irish jig.
- 5 **Sing a Simple Rhyme** (duration 2:10)
This song will fundamentally improve the ways that children attend to sound patterns in words. Wordplay and word associations invite children to provide words that rhyme. This song offers instruction on what a rhyme is and then gives directed practice in identifying a potential rhyming word ending and listening to words that rhyme with that ending.
- 6 **The Adjective Song** (duration 1:38)
This song has a Middle Eastern musical style, clearly stating the concept “An adjective is a word that describes a noun.” It then elaborates on how descriptions might include such characteristics as color, shape, size, age, smell, taste, feel, attitude, worth, and more!
- 7 **Signs** (duration 1:28)
It’s important to pay attention to the signs around us everywhere that sometimes are there to keep us safe and safely moving in our fast-paced, often crowded world! This song encourages students to be able to read and pay attention to the signs all around them.

The ***SC Chronicles Series*** of one-hour courses will enhance the understanding of SC history and add a repertoire of material to use in the classroom. The video sessions focus on integrating SC history into the social studies curriculum. As participants gain a greater understanding of South Carolina history, they will be able to teach state curriculum standards with an updated historical knowledge of South Carolina history. [All class meetings will take place through online learning. The instructor and participants will communicate via Moodle — the course platform on the Internet. Assignments and discussion forums will be facilitated in Moodle.](#)

SC Chronicles Series I: Geography, Native Americans & Colonial Period

Noted South Carolina historian Dr. Walter Edgar discusses key issues in early SC History. Experience an archeological adventure at the Topper dig site in Allendale County, learn about the rise and fall of rice-growing in South Carolina and its impact on the state, and find out the true tales of treachery and villainy that occurred off the coast of South Carolina during the Golden Age of Piracy. You will also virtually visit sites around the Palmetto State and learn about their historic and special relevance to South Carolina today.

SC Chronicles Series II: The Winds of Discontent

Noted South Carolina historian Dr. Walter Edgar discusses three key issues in early SC History: The winds of discontent in SC, The American Revolution in the Low Country and The American Revolution in the Up Country. Learn about Francis Marion's partisan campaigns during the American Revolution in SC and the historical importance of the Battle of Camden. You will also view new programs about heroines in our state who have shaped South Carolina history and virtually visit sites around the Palmetto State and learn about their historic and special relevance to South Carolina today.

SC Chronicles Series III: Post Revolutionary

Noted South Carolina historian Dr. Walter Edgar discusses key issues in early SC History: Life and Culture in the New States 1786-1808, The Antebellum Period 1793-1822 and Southern Discontent 1830-1860. Participants learn about Charles Pinckney, the Forgotten Founder who contributed to the birth of our nation and the construction of the Santee Canal, considered the first "true" canal in this country. Participants will view a new program about the Grimke Sisters who spoke out at an early age against slavery and virtually visit sites around the Palmetto State and learn about their historic and special relevance to South Carolina today.

SC Chronicles Series IV: Civil War

Noted South Carolina historian Dr. Walter Edgar discusses key issues in SC History. South Carolina and the Civil War are discussed in three lessons: Secession from the Union, Beginning of the Civil War and Civil War in South Carolina. Participants will learn about political events, personalities, military campaigns, participation of African Americans, and the upheaval of this period in SC. We will visit the SC State Museum as they focus on the 150th anniversary of the start of the Civil War, featuring the museum's exhibit and program plans marking the historic events that led to the firing on Fort Sumter. The course also includes *The Story of Mary Boykin Chestnut* and her writings, which became "A Diary from Dixie."

SC Chronicles Series V: Art and Culture

Noted South Carolina historian Dr. Walter Edgar discusses key issues in SC History. SC art and architecture are discussed: 1) Art and Architecture, 2) Frontier, 3) Art and Purchasing, 4) Colonial Education. SC music and musicians are discussed: 1) Southern Music, 2) Blending of Musical Cultures, 3) Spoleto Festival, 4) Opera Houses and Theaters. The course includes programs from the *SC State Museum Resources for Educators* featuring exhibits of SC pottery, stoneware, baskets, and quilts. Included are highlights from the Holcombe family stoneware collection, ranging from exquisite pottery from the old Edgefield district, the highly-recognized slave potter Dave and South Carolina Silver: Varieties in Society, 1750–1910. The course will also explore the work of local authors and artists and virtually visit Brookgreen Gardens, a National Historic Landmark located on the coast of South Carolina and the Gullah-Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor.
